

Mann Tosses No-Hit Game

Garth (Red) Mann, who had sweated out most of his time this season in the dugout after a successful record last year, got the Pacific Coast Baseball league's third 1946 initiation into the exclusive circle of no-hit, no-run pitchers.

The 39-year-old right-hander, native of Brandon, Tex., attained his place in the society last night in blanking the Seattle Rainiers, 8 to 0, as his Sacramento teammates played errorless ball.

Mann fanned eight and walked three Rainiers. One of the passed men got to second, another was thrown out trying to steal second, and the third was snuffed out on a double play.

The no-hit hurler broke into organized baseball at Hayne, La., in the Evangeline league, and has put in eight years of minor league play. Last year he was the Oakland A's top pitcher with 15 victories, but he had behind him only one win and one loss for 1946 when he went to the Sacramento Solons from the circuit-pacing Oakland club 11 days ago. Joe Demoran of Seattle and Ad Liska of Portland previously hurled no-hitters this season.

Fishing's Fun

Matt Finnigan, Mr. Fishing himself, has inaugurated a weekly radio broadcast over KFLW in which he gives the most likely means and methods of luring a trout out of some favorite spots around here, and even doing the casual angler the service of planning a day's trip right down to the point of telling a good spot for consuming the midday lunch.

According to the game commission's weekly release, Klamath and Lake counties are expected to afford the best fishing in the state this weekend, the northern part of the state still being troubled with high waters, and from the looks of the catch of rainbow and German Brown taken by Ernie Bishop and party on spinners and by flat fishing, the Upper lake and streams coming in are the places to go.

Matt recommends a try at Harziman creek, trolling along the west shore of the lake past Rocky Point into Recreation creek, or trolling south of Harziman creek.

Fish are being taken just off the dock at Rocky Point on wobblers, Flashers and worms, or a flasher and minnow should work along the shore.

Lee Esing says that around Paradise lodge and up to Eagle ridge is beginning to be good fishing with large flashers and worms trolled deep and slow, and around there you can take your choice of lures.

In coming across the lake from Neptune beach some good sized fish have been caught with both flashers and wobblers, with wobblers being the most popular. Among the best spots right now are the mouths of Sevenmile and Wood river, Wood river itself. Cluster eggs should fill the bill up there.

Lake o' the Woods and Fish lake both reported fair and expected to be getting better. The Sprague is high but some catches made just the same on bait.

Up at Crescent lake there have been accounts of good trolling, using Ford Fenders with worms, but you can get into an argument about Crescent lake right quick. Some folks we know swear by it and some others swear at it.

Odell lake is a sure thing, trolling brass spinners with worms deep. Matt advances the idea of plug-casting in close to shore late in the evening. Paulina and East lake are up to the fishermen, according to reports. Marsh creek, limits taken on flies, same for Little Deschutes and Odell creek.

Getting closer to home, Klamath river has been good and bad, depending on the water level, but large bucktail flies are good here.

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Grimm Gives Up On Nicholson

CHICAGO, June 1 (AP)—Manager Charles Grimm, re-patting his threadbare Chicago Cubs lineup for the 17th time, no less, this season, admitted today he has given up on Bill Nicholson, National league home-run and run-batted-in champion in 1943 and 1944.

Movies of his once-feared swing at the plate, eye tests and the bench treatment have failed to lead Big Nick from a mysterious batting slump which dates back to last season when he finished with a .243 mark.

Rightfielder Nicholson had a 16-day chance to unlimber his budgeon when Rookie Ed Waitkus was injured and Phil Cavaretta moved from right to his old first base spot, but woeful William wound up with a waa .174 listing.

The opener will be between a pair of lightweight boys, weighing in at about 128 pounds. Paul Wilson will make his second appearance in the local ring, doing battle with Don Reynolds.

In his first bout a month ago Reynolds was the victim of a quick knockout by Gaylor Hatcher, while Wilson on decided Darrell Haral two weeks ago.

In the second bout Rudy Carlson meets Charlie Hill of Chiloquin for a welterweight duel with the eight-ounce gloves.

Both these prelims are scheduled for four rounds. In the main event a bout between Will Knock who on the last card kayped Johnnie Ruff in the fourth canto, against an opponent as yet not selected.

A middleweight bout is the main fare between Johnny Jones of Klamath and Billy Sunday of Chiloquin, set for five rounds, and sharing part of the main event spotlight will be Roger Vanderhoff and LeRoy Barkley in a lightweight duel.

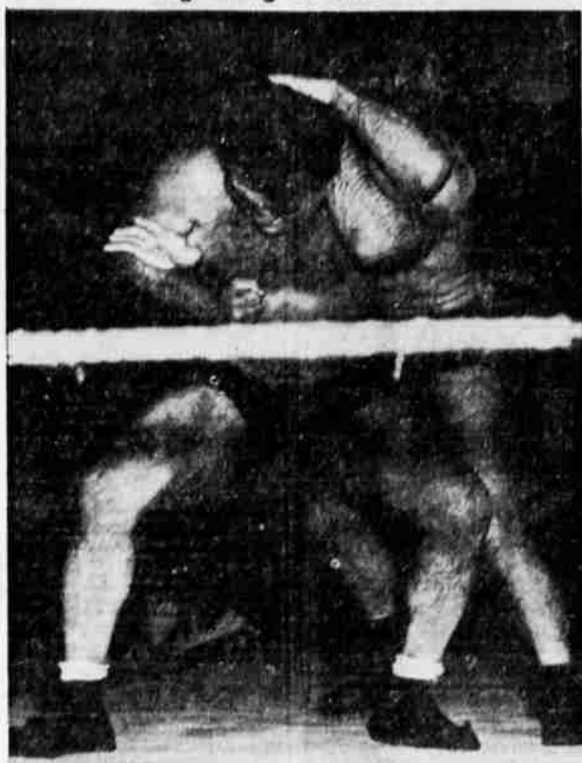

Cards, Red Sox Following Principle Of Close Wins

If winning tight one-run games means a pennant as John McGraw used to say when the immortal Giant manager was the host of New York, the first place Boston Sox and the second place St. Louis Cardinals are world series bound.

As most of the big league clubs resumed operations today following a day of rest—only the New York Yankees and Philadelphia Athletics played yesterday—a survey of the first quarter of the major league races revealed that of 301 games played roughly one-third or 88 have been decided by a single tally.

Joe Cronin's rampant Red Sox, currently pacing the American league by six games, have the best record of pulling those tight ones out of the fire. They have won nine of 11 for a .818 percentage, far above the Detroit Tigers and Cleveland Indians who are tied for second with eight of 14 and six of 10 respectively.

Washington has won six of 11 and the St. Louis Browns have been involved in 13 close ones, winning five. Surprisingly enough, the New York Yankees, who are giving the Red Sox their stiffest competition, have grabbed but three in nine one-run games. The tall Philadelphia Athletics have had the worst luck in the close ones, losing nine of 12.

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Strong Nine Readied For Shasta Tilt

Tomorrow's baseball game at Mt. Shasta will be the third round contest of the season for the Klamath Sons without a performance before the home fans, but starting Sunday week four games in a row are slated for Recreation field.

The only tilt scheduled for Klamath Falls yet this season was rained out last week and will be made up later in the summer.

In two league games so far the Sons have come out on top by comfortable margins, 8-0 over McCloud and 7-2 over Dunsmuir, and have shown creditable power at the plate in addition to having two of the best pitchers in the area.

Clyde Carlstrom, who hurled the three-hit shutout over McCloud, is due for the starting nod on the mound tomorrow, and Johnny Pastega will be re-riding behind the platter.

Ernie Bishop will probably be along to take a spot in the infield, Jim Bocci may see action at first base along with Jack Durocha, and H. L. Smith has returned from a trip back east and will be an added outfielder.

The Sons' chartered bus will leave the bus depot about 9:15 tomorrow for the run to Mt. Shasta and space will be available for a number of fans to go along. Tickets may be purchased at the Klamath Billiards and Pastega's store.

The game will begin at 1:30 and KFLW's play-by-play broadcast is scheduled to go on the air at 2 p. m. However, a hitch has been uncovered in that direction and as of this morning a power line has not been taken into the Mt. Shasta field.

Unless the line is installed before game time tomorrow KFLW will have the alternative of furnishing its own power or not broadcasting. The radio people are trying to iron out that wrinkle today.

Ruth By-Passed By MacPhail For Newark Manager Post

NEW YORK, June 1 (AP)—Babe Ruth, the former sultan of swat, disclosed today he had sought in vain to be appointed manager this year of the Newark International League baseball club, the same post he was offered but rejected when he left the Yankees 12 years ago.

Returning from a visit to Mexico City at 1:15 a. m. (Est) the Babe declared "I called MacPhail (Larry MacPhail, president of the Yanks) early last January when I heard that Bill Dickey had turned down an offer to manage Newark. I told MacPhail I was very much interested in the Newark job. He was very much surprised and said 'This is like a thunderbolt out of the sky, but I promise you every consideration and I'll phone you within two weeks to give you a definite answer.'"

"I waited two weeks," Ruth continued. "But when MacPhail didn't call I phoned him again. He told me he was waiting for George Weiss (vice president of the Yanks) to get back from Chicago. Later I phoned him once more and he told me someone else had been promised the job."

George Selkirk, who replaced Ruth in right field back in 1934, later was named Newark manager.

Asked if MacPhail had promised something for next year, Ruth replied only, "I'm very tired" and jumped into a waiting auto.

Hogan was leading in points, being 25 on the plus side in the system used in this tourney that combines the best parts of match and medal play.
