Redbirds Fall Behind Brooks

The St. Louis Cardinals, pre-season favorites in the National League, may wind up among the also-rans because of their inability to win at home.
Including yesterday's double loss to the New York Giants, which dropped them three and a half games behind pace-setting Brooklyn, the Redbirds have won only six of 15 games at Sportsman's Park—a percentage of .400, and fully 190 points below their over-all pace.

Oaks Keep Loop Lead

Portland and San Diego play tonight at 8 o'clock, to finish up their series. Portland then goes to Sacramento, Seattle to Los Angeles for this week's other contests.

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Fullerton Burns Up Amateur Cinder Path

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3 (AP)
An unofficial 4:20.5 mile run by George Fullerton, Ashland high school, in the Oregon AAU open meet here Saturday clipped nearly a second off the official all-time mile record for American high school runners.
Fullerton's cinder-scorching pace was not officially timed because he was bested by three strides in the last 40 yards of the race by Dick Petterson, Oregon State freshman, who was clocked at 4:19.9.
The prep mile record was set 12 years ago by Lou Zampieri for Torrance, Calif., at 4:21.2.
Most entries in the AAU events bettered previous marks of the last meet held in 1942.

Briton Tired Of Off Losing

LONDON, June 3 (AP)—A suggestion that Britain "conscript for sport" to offset its role as "perpetual loser" has been made by Peter Wilson, one of London's better known sports writers.
After citing a long list of smarming British defeats that included Dick Burton's loss to Byron Nelson, Bruce Woodcock's beating by Tami Mauriello and tennis defeats at the hands of France and Australia, Wilson asserted: "Britain has come to the crossroads in international sport."

Fred Martin, rookie righthander, who came south with Lanier under the lure of the Mexican dollar, pitched on relief for the losers and Lou Klein, the third of the "jumping" Cards, played shortstop behind Lanier, chipping in with two hits and scoring twice.

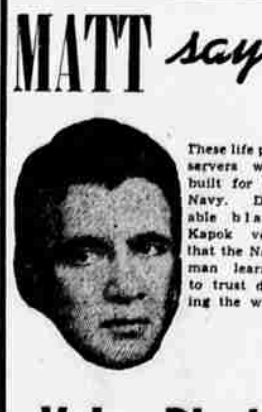
