Potato Plant For Merrill

Construction is slated to begin as soon as possible on the proposed Simplot potato by-products plant at Merrill, according to N. W. Ramsen, representative of the Simplot company. The plant will be built by the Simplot company, of Caldwell, Idaho, on a 26-acre plot of ground just east of Merrill. Construction will start as soon as materials are available, said Ramsen, and it is hoped that the plant will be in full production sometime this fall.

The plant will produce potato by-products such as starch and glucose, and may install an alcohol plant.

Short To Quit Barracks Post

Capt. James T. Short, who has been in command of the Marine Barracks since it was declared surplus by the navy department last February, has been ordered to Quantico, Va., for duty and will probably leave Friday.

Taking his place as commanding officer of the marine detachment still at the barracks will be Lt. Col. J. R. Clark. Captain Short said today that he has no word that the remaining marines would be taken from the barracks any time soon. The installation is now in the hands of the War Assets administration but the captain said that it was his understanding that the 100-man detachment would remain until the state of Oregon or some other agency

assumes control of the barracks.

The WAA has no intention of relieving the marines and sending a civilian crew in to maintain the installation, so far as Captain Short has been informed.

At present the state of Oregon is dickering with the WAA for possible acquisition of the barracks to be used for a veterans school, supplementing the two state universities.
