

City Council Sanctions Michigan Avenue Paving

Michigan avenue, long synonymous with the city's street improvement problems, is considerably closer to being paved. The city council last night gave City Engineer E. A. Thomas authority to go ahead with the necessary arrangements to get the job of paving the street under way.

Several weeks ago, property owners on Michigan again presented a petition for street improvement to the council. The matter was referred to Thomas for study. His report revealed that Michigan is one of those streets in which the cost of improvement would amount to more than the assessed value of the property.

Thomas stated that by cutting the width of the street to 32 feet, the improvement cost can be lowered to a level with the assessed property value. Narrowing the street will not cause a traffic problem, according to Thomas, and a number of other Klamath Falls streets are narrower than the proposed 32 feet.

The council accepted Thomas' preliminary plans and authorized him to complete arrangements for paving there.

Sewer Petition Futile
A recent petition from property owners in Eldorado Heights for sewage and sanitary facilities has been studied by Thomas who reported that differences in the assessment value and the cost of installing sewage and sanitary facilities is so great that at the present time the city can do nothing about the property owners' request. The city engineer was instructed to answer the petition explaining that because of the law concerning the relation of the cost of improvement to the assessment value, it is impossible to comply with the request at the present time.

Plans were submitted by the Shell Oil company for eliminating the hazard of the chalk cliff behind the Shell service station on Oregon and Donald. The cliff behind the station has been wearing away and is endangering property at the top and in some places is wearing away the city alley on the cliff edge. The company proposes to change the angle of the face of the cliff, making it less steep. Thomas expressed the opinion that by sloping the angle, the cliff would no longer sluff away and the hazard would be eliminated. The plans for the work which will be done by the Shell

company under the supervision of the city engineer were okayed by the council.

Police Request Raise
A letter signed by Frank Blackmer representing the city police force, in which the police requested a salary raise, was read. Police are asking for \$225. Representatives of the force met with the mayor and council this afternoon to explain their case. Action on the matter was postponed at last night's meeting.

Last week a question arose concerning a license for the operation of a motor scooter establishment which would sell, rent, and instruct in the use of the scooters. Police Chief Orville Hamilton reported to the council that there is no ordinance governing use of the scooters. The council authorized the police committee, the city attorney and the chief of police to arrange details for forming an ordinance pertaining to the use of motor scooters.

The chief of police will appoint one man, along with the city engineer, to attend traffic school in Corvallis June 17 to 28.

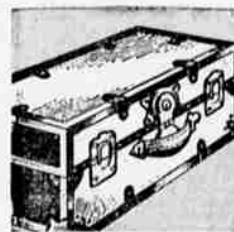

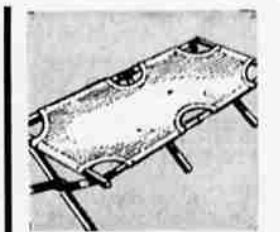
