Polish Leader Charges Plot

WARSAW, Poland, June 5 (Delayed)—(AP)—Vice Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk has charged in an address that the Warsaw regime was trying to destroy his Polish peasant party through force, armed bands and secret police.

Mikolajczyk, who formerly was premier of the Polish government in exile, spoke before the general council of his party, but the text has not been published here because of censorship.

He declared that an attempt was under way to "railroad" the June 30 referendum, charging that peasant party members were rejected as polling clerks in all but three of Poland's 17 provinces. The referendum is to obtain voters' views of the government's policies of nationalization of industries, and other measures.

The vice premier charged that the government was using secret police to plant evidence purporting to show the Polish peasant party was linked with terrorist bands.

The peasant leader also charged that the recent action of the security police in padlocking and suspending activities of six peasant district headquarters violated the 1921 constitution. He questioned the legality of the government's formation of the reserve militia, which had placed guns in the hands of 30,000 in the last 60 days.

Alaskan Road Study Approved by House

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Creation of an international highway commission to study routes between the United States and Alaska was approved today by the house.

As sent to the senate, the bill would set up an eight-man commission, two of whom would be members of congress, to cooperate with a similar group to be appointed by the Canadian government.

Passage of the measure came on a voice vote in which members are not recorded.

aging the truck beyond repair, and that he was painfully injured in the accident.

He charges that the SP locomotive was in motion crossing the highway and that the railway was negligent in not maintaining a warning signal or flagman, and that he did not hear any warning whistle or bell from the train.

Newcomb testified that when he first saw the train come into the crossing he was less than 100 feet away and driving his truck about 15 miles an hour. He said that he applied his brakes but crashed into the first drive wheel of the engine.

James C. Dezenendorf, SP attorney, at this point read to the jury, the credibility of the witness, a statement signed by Newcomb and made a few days after the accident. In that statement Newcomb said that he was traveling 20 to 25 miles an hour, was 100 feet from the locomotive when he applied his brakes and that the brakes seemed to catch at first but the weight of the truck and trailer seemed to push the vehicle into the locomotive.

The Southern Pacific's contention is that Newcomb was driving faster than the situation warranted and that his brakes were faulty.

Also in the statement Newcomb had said that his truck was in third gear and had a noisy transmission, so that warnings might have sounded without him hearing them.

Pre-Trial Conference

In federal court hearings the facts agreed upon by both parties and the contentions of each side are brought out in a pre-trial conference, and Judge Fee read the facts and issues of this case to the veniremen before the trial began.
