

Foster Homes Need Stressed

Gerald Murray, county juvenile officer, at the Tuesday meeting of the juvenile court committee, pointed out the urgent need for good foster homes for children under the care of the juvenile court.

The committee agreed to develop a community campaign among local service clubs to stress the necessity of getting good homes for the youngsters. Mrs. M. P. Leonard was elected permanent chairman of the committee with Lynn Roycroft, permanent secretary. Harold Hendrickson was appointed to draw up bylaws and a constitution for the group, assisted by Dayton E. Van Vactor.

Murray reported on action taken by the budget committee relative to the juvenile court budget for the next fiscal year. He added that the staff now has a full-time car at its disposal. Arrangements have been made with the matron of the juvenile detention cottage for night supervision of the cottage. The group discussed what it considered to be the present low

The juvenile court committee decided to assist the child care, health, and welfare committee, a newly formed group which will consist of all agencies dealing with children. KUHS Summer Class Has 50

Fifty students make up the enrollment of summer school at Klamath Union high school this year, with over twice as many girls as boys attending the summer classes. With the exception of freshmen, students from every class in high school are enrolled.

A few seniors who participated in the commencement exercises are attending the school to finish up their credits, and many graduating juniors are taking social economics, a required subject before graduation. Two veterans are taking a refresher course, minus credit, before entering college.

Three teachers handle the summer school students, teaching hour-and-a-half periods for each subject. These teachers are Dorothy Bailey, Mrs. Helen Hoffman, and Don Ross. One credit is given for each subject if passed.

Students will finish summer school on July 3 rather than the regular date of July 5. School was held on Memorial Day, a holiday, by vote of the students,

in order to be through by July 3. Subjects being offered summer students are Latin 2, social economics 1-2, history, civics 1-2, geometry 2, algebra 1-2 and review, general science 2, general math 2, typing, typing 2, English literature 2-3, English 1-3.

CHICAGO, June 6 (AP)—Heavy profit-taking toward the close cancelled gains in oats contracts today, leaving final prices mixed. At one time gains extended to more than a cent, wheat registered in buying stimulated by an uptick at Minneapolis and belief that price ceilings are removed from livestock and poultry.
Chicago and commission houses were on the buying side early in the session, but rapidly lowered bids close when professional traders decided it was time to accept profits in view of the excellent crop outlook. Cash purchases for future delivery totaled 90,000 bushels.
At these oats were 1/2 cent lower to 1/4 cent higher, July 8c. Corn was unchanged to 1/4 cent higher, July 41 1/2. All other grains were unchanged to 1/4 cent higher in July, September and December wheat at the 1 1/2 cent ceilings.
