

# KF Citizens To Prepare For Visitors

"In what streams will I find black bass?" "Where's the cut-off to Crater lake?" "Where's the best place to shoot a duck?" In an endeavor to make the average citizen of Klamath Falls ready with the answers to these questions as well as fully conscious of the scenic and recreational attractions of the area, the tourist committee of the chamber of commerce is inaugurating a broad educational program.

Plans call for a "clinical" approach to the project. Local service clubs will hear speakers and see slides and moving pictures which illustrate the lesser-known but potential drawing cards for the tourist trade here. Through the service clubs, the heads of Klamath business firms and industries will be contacted. From them it is hoped this "tourist consciousness" will spread to the people who meet the visitors directly—the filling station attendants, waitresses, sales personnel and "men-on-the-street." The chamber of commerce hopes not only to familiarize them with local attractions but also keep them posted on the latest developments and improvements in tourist facilities.

As another feature of this program, markers advertising what the Klamath country has to offer tourists will be set up at prominent places along highway 97. In this connection a huge, eye-catching marker, fully lighted, will be placed near Goshen on the Willamette highway around June 15. Another sign has been erected outside of Weed on highway 97.

According to Matt Finnigan, member of the tourist committee, the program is intended to create "an ideal set-up for tourists in this area." He added that "we are sitting on a veritable gold mine and we don't know it." The local chamber of commerce is working in conjunction with the Bend and Alturas chambers on this program.

# Packer Hormel Dies At Age 85

LOS ANGELES, June 6 (AP)—George Albert Hormel, 85, an immigrant's son who rose from butcher boy to millionaire packer, died yesterday.

He founded the George A. Hormel Packing company at Austin, Minn., in 1892, retiring as president in 1927, when he came to California, but continuing as board chairman. Hormel, born in Buffalo, N. Y., left school at the age of 13. He became a butcher's delivery boy and worked at other jobs until, at 27, he borrowed

\$500 to make a down payment on a small country meat market at Austin, the start of his large packing house chain which now employs more than 6000. The packer was a firm believer in private enterprise and free competition. "We must not curb competition," he had declared. "Open competition will keep each group of industries on its toes, demanding all the genius and skill of their people in order to serve the consuming public with a better product at a lower cost."
