

'Boy's Town' For Medford

MEDFORD, June 6 (AP)—A ranch type boys' community will be developed for needy youth from all states of the union at the "Stagecoach" ranch of Gordon Green, wealthy Medford orchardist, it was reported today.

Operation of the project will be underway by 1948, Green said, but details of how the boys are to be selected for residence at the community—located on Boys' Town, Neb.—have not been completed.

Counselors will direct the boys' school through the equivalent of one year of high school and at the same time conduct an extensive recreational program of hunting, fishing and outdoor sports.

Although Green will undertake to finance the venture, he plans to ask six nationally known leaders—three from the west and three from the east—to cooperate in making selection of the boys.

Several phases of the community activity will be partly self-sustaining, Green reported, including care of a 30-acre pear orchard and cattle raising.

Certificate of filing articles of incorporation has been received in the proposed purchase of the Klamath Heating plant by local consumers, and application is now being made to the corporation commissioner for permission to solicit subscriptions.

The original June 10 date for closing the purchase with the present owners has been extended until June 20.
