KF Artists' Work Shown

At the fourth all-Oregon art exhibition on view at the Portland art museum through June, the work of two Klamath Falls artists is on display.

An oil painting, "Sur La Pointe," by Virginia White Brown, and a watercolor, "Our Street," by Mrs. F. C. Wisenbach are the exhibited works of local artists.

The exhibition consists of 245 works by artists of Oregon and the bordering Washington area. There are over 200 paintings in oils, tempera, watercolor, pastel, and gouache, and 22 pieces of sculpture in plaster, bronze, terra cotta, and wood.

All the works are for sale and are being bought by the public which has proven itself eager for Oregon art.

County Health Work Praised

At the year's first board meeting of the Klamath County Public Health association Wednesday, Lawrence Slater, president, received a citation on behalf of the local group from the Oregon state association for the 25 years of service rendered by this county's health organization.

The citation, presented by Mrs. R. P. Ellingson Sr., past president and delegate to the recent state convention, stated that the award is being given on the silver anniversary of the county association for "25 years of continuous service and commendable effort."

Mrs. Ellingson reported on the annual meeting of the Oregon State Tuberculosis association held in Portland May 27 and 28, to which she was the local delegate. In her report she dealt with the possibility of widening the scope of health activities.

Other reports were given by various committee chairmen and members. Among them were John H. Houston, finance; Charles B. Larkin, case finding; Mrs. E. A. Geary, social hygiene; E. H. Thompson, health education; L. Orth Sismore, tuberculosis seal sale; Mrs. James F. Clark, membership; Arnold L. Vets' Flying School Open On Monday

Final approval from the Veterans administration has been granted the Shasta-Cascade Flying Service, according to Ray Royce, manager, and flying instruction for Klamath area veterans will get under way Monday morning.

A class of approximately 30 students is expected to attend the opening session, with other applicants taking their places as the course is finished. Hours, according to Royce, will be from daylight to dusk in order to give the men who are working a chance to get their instruction in a reasonably short time.

Instruction at Shasta-Cascade will be under the supervision of Dave M. Zumwalt ex-navy flier. Zumwalt is credited with 3000 hours in the air, and is a former instructor for Calkins Aircraft in Spokane, where he instructed in CPT, primary, secondary and finisher courses. Zumwalt joined the navy in 1942 and was assigned as an instructor till 1944, when he was transferred to naval air transport service and flew the navy runs for the South Pacific. He was discharged in January of 1946, and went to work for Royce as instructor. He holds both commercial and instructor's licenses in single and multi engine planes.

Royce, manager of the flying school, served as a fighter pilot with the army for three years in Italy. On his discharge in 1945 he returned to Klamath and operated the Shasta-Cascade flying service from the Worden airfield prior to moving into present headquarters at the municipal airport.

Veterans who plan to take advantage of the flying school should first apply to the veterans administration for a certificate of eligibility, which can be obtained on showing certificate of discharge. A physical examination will be required from CAA doctors, and then application should be made to Royce for flying instruction.

Krug Will Discuss Columbia River Job

OLYMPIA, June 7 (AP)—Possibility of expanding the Columbia river project will be discussed in Spokane June 12 when Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug meets with the state Columbia basin commission.

Arthur Garton, chairman of the state commission, said his group will present definite plans for orderly development of the Columbia river and its basin within the state of Washington.

"We will discuss problems in connection with the construction of the McNary dam and seek a mutual understanding on the Foster Creek dam," Garton said.

Saws Stolen From Loggers

Two power saws, belonging to Frank Lumpkin and Harry Gregg, were apparently stolen sometime last night from the Big Lakes Logging company holdings at Seven Mile creek.

Lumpkin and Gregg, employed by Big Lakes as timber fallers, left the saws at the scene of their work when they finished work yesterday. When they returned to the site this morning the saws, along with axes, tools and spare parts were missing.

The two machines were left approximately three-quarters of a mile apart in the woods, and were about four miles from the highway. Lumpkin said his saw was insured for about half its value. There was no insurance on the Gregg saw.

Deputy Sheriff Marion Barnes from Klamath Falls, is investigating the scene of the theft.

Virgil Lary, Winchester, Ky., identifies former SS Trooper George Fleps as the German soldier whose pistol shots touched off the slaughter of 171 unarmed American prisoners at Malmedy, Belgium, December 17, 1944, during the Battle of the Bulge. Dramatic accusation was made to climax testimony made by Lary, a survivor of the massacre, during the trial at Dachau, Germany, of 74 nazis charged with the massacre of 800 American prisoners during the Nazi offensive.
