League Adopts New Platform

At the annual meeting of the Oregon League of Women Voters, held in Eugene May 27 and 28, a work program was adopted for this year consisting primarily of the equalization of school taxation and the extension of youth services.

The new platform for the league includes the protection of civic and economic rights of minority groups, the merit system, the reorganization of county government, the consolidation of school districts, increased state aid for public schools, improved child welfare services, and improvements in state institutions.

Anna Lord Strauss of New York, president of the National League of Women Voters, was the featured speaker at the state convention and stressed the need for the rationing of essential foods to help feed the hungry in Europe and Asia.

Miss Strauss served as a member of the United States delegation at the first meeting of the food and agriculture organization and is currently a member of President Truman's famine emergency committee.
