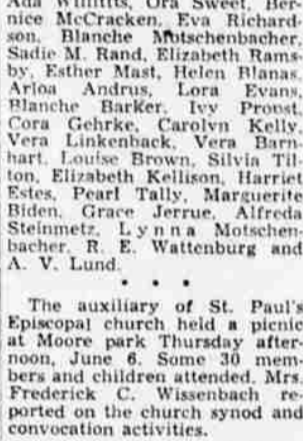
Frances Munsell gave a full report of the state assembly held in Medford last month, and her report was enlarged upon by Stella Dryden and Marguerite Landis.
