

# Swimmers Register At KUHS

Prospective swimmers lined the street in front of the Klamath Union high school swimming pool today as registration for the summer program got under way. Almost 250 registrants had signed up by early afternoon, with more still coming.

Joe Peak and Dorothy Gustafson, instructors for the summer swim course, said about 35 will be admitted to each of the seven beginning classes, while about 60 or 70 could be handled in the advance swimmers' classes. Each student is required to bring his own suit, a towel, and 15 cents for each swim period.

An attempt is being made to put the smaller children into afternoon classes, said Peak, and the older ones, who are able to be there earlier in the morning, are being fitted into classes before noon. The schedules for beginners and swimmers change every other week, emphasized Peak, and all registrants who come in late must register in person and not by phone.

Adult swimming will begin tomorrow, as will classes. The pool will be open each weekday for the public from 6 to 9 p. m. Price of admission will be 50 cents per person with an extra charge for suit rental.

The schedule of swimming classes for the week of June 11 to 14 only will be 9 to 10 a. m., 11 to 12-year-old beginners; 10 to 11 a. m., beginners; 11 to noon, 9 to 10-year-old swimmers. In the afternoon, 1 to 2 p. m., will be for 7 to 8-year-old beginners; 2 to 3 p. m., 7 and 8-year-old beginners; 3 to 4 p. m., 11 to 12-year-old swimmers.

Wednesday and Friday will be 9 to 10 a. m., 11 and 12-year-old swimmers; 10 to 11 a. m., 13 years and over beginners; 11 to noon, 13 years and over, swimmers. The afternoon schedule will be 1 to 2 p. m., 9 and 10-year-old beginners; 2 to 3 p. m., 9 and 10-year-old beginners; and 3 to 4 p. m., 13-year-old and older swimmers.

Dorothy Gustafson and Joe Peak will alternately teach classes.

# Justice Black, Jackson In Feud

JUSTICE Black and Jackson are in a feud over the naturalization of a German who later was accused of working in this country in behalf of the Nazi party.

The decision was given on an appeal by Paul Knauer, who was granted citizenship by a state court in Milwaukee in 1937. His certificate was cancelled in 1944 by the U. S. district court in Milwaukee on the ground he had taken a false oath of allegiance.

Justice Douglas delivered the 5-2 decision. Justice Rutledge wrote a dissenting opinion in which Justice Murphy joined. Justice Black delivered a separate concurring opinion. Justice Jackson took no part.

Justice Douglas in the majority opinion said "the conclusion is irresistible that when Knauer foreswore allegiance to the German Reich he swore falsely."

He said that when an alien takes the oath with reservations or does not "in good faith" foreswear loyalty to the old country then the decree of naturalization is obtained by deceit.

The proceeding itself is then founded on fraud. A fraud is perpetuated on the naturalization court," Douglas wrote.

Justice Black's law partner was involved.

Jackson, chief U. S. war crimes prosecutor at the Nuernberg trials, cabled a sharp-tongued statement to house and senate judicial committees to answer what he called unjustified attacks in the press. He intimated Black was behind those attacks.

"It is high time that congress has the facts," Jackson asserted. "If war is declared on me, I propose to wage it with weapons of an open warrior, not those of a stealthy assassin."

# Strike Peace Attempt Fails

VANCOUVER, June 10 (CP)—An attempt by the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) to have production of strawberry boxes resumed at Fraser Wood Products plant here failed today because of inability of operators and union to agree upon terms of a proposed truce.

The strike of 35,000 woodworkers which began May 15 appeared no nearer settlement today as unionists prepared for a march on Victoria next Friday in an effort to win support for their demands of 25-cents-an-hour increase in pay, 40-hour week and union security.

Harold Pritcnett, union leader, said today that union truce proposals were offered to operators of the Fraser Wood Products plant, while about 100 union members congregated in front of the premises carrying lunch pails, prepared to go to work immediately if an agreement was reached.

After meeting the operators, Mr. Pritcnett told the assembled strikers: "There is not much likelihood of co-operation. We were referred to Stuart Research as the bargaining agency, and told that operation could begin only if we accepted the old terms which we are protesting. Naturally we cannot do business on those terms."

A delegation of Lulu Island fruit growers arrived just too late to interview plant officials with union leaders.

Mr. Alex Laka, spokesman for the growers, declared that if boxes could not be obtained at a loss to canners.

The Hanev mill, only producer of strawberry boxes in the Fraser valley, was closed today because of shortage of veneer for the boxes.
