

Police May Get \$10 Pay Boost

City policemen, including all members of the force except Police Chief Orville Hamilton, the assistant chief, and one sergeant, will get a wage boost of \$10 a month beginning July under the new city budget estimate.

Klamath Falls police still rank sixth in the state as far as wages are concerned, Frank Blackmer, president of the Police Beneficiary association, said today, with Portland, Bend, Medford, Salem and Eugene paying policemen more than this city does.

More arrests are made here according to population, than in any city in Oregon, Blackmer said, and the other towns mentioned are also included in the retirement setup which was voted down here May 17.

Members of the force asked the city council for a \$30 a month raise but only the \$10 hike was approved by the budget committee.

Agreement Ends Smelter Strike

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—An agreement between the CIO-Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers and the American Smelting and Refining Co., ending a five-month strike at 18 plants was signed yesterday.

Government conciliators aided in the settlement.

Work is to be resumed by the 5000 employees, on strike since January 21, next Monday, subject to local settlements.

The federal fact finding board's recommended 184 cent hourly wage increase was agreed upon, with half or 91 to be retroactive to Oct. 1, 1945. The balance is to be effected with resumption of operations, presumably June 17.

Portland Utility To Retire Debt

PHILADELPHIA, June 12 (AP)—The Portland (Ore.) Gas and Coke company intends to retire long-term debt with proceeds from sale of \$10,000,000 of first mortgage bonds, due 1976, the company declared in a registration statement filed with the securities and exchange commission today.

Names of the underwriters and public offering price are to be determined in competitive bidding.

County Receives Photostat Machine

The new photostat machine, which the county has had on order for 15 months, has arrived and is now in operation.

The machine is fully automatic and operates continually from the time a paper is photographed at one end until the print goes through a drum drier at the other. In between are the processes of development of the negative, printing, developing the print and washing.

A finished print can be made in about 45 seconds. The county has also cut down the size of photostatic copies to take less space in files.

Sen. Bankhead Passes At 73

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Senator John H. Bankhead of Alabama died today. He was 73.

Bankhead suffered a stroke the night of May 24, while attending a senate committee meeting. He was taken unconscious to the U. S. Naval hospital at suburban Bethesda, Md., where death occurred.

A democrat, he was elected to the senate in 1930. He was a brother of the late Speaker William B. Bankhead and was an uncle of Tallulah Bankhead, the actress. His father was a U. S. senator, and his son, Walter Will Bankhead, served a brief term in the house.

The Alabamian was author of many major farm bills passed in the new deal era.

Arab Denounces Holy Land Plan

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—An Anglo-American committee recommendation that 100,000 Jews be allowed to immigrate into Palestine is an improper interference with another country's affairs, Aouny, D. Delany of the Arab office in Washington declared here today.

The Jerusalem-born Arab, here to speak at the Reed college Northwest Institute of International Relations, asserted in an interview that "no country has the right to dictate the internal policies of another."

Army Nabs Another In Royal Gem Theft

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The war department today announced the arrest of Roy C. Carlton, a former enlisted man, for investigation in connection with the Kronberg castle jewel theft.

An army officer said that Carlton, the fourth person seized in the fabulous case, had been arrested by federal customs agents at his home in Kilgore, Tex.

Carlton, the officer said, is the reputed owner of a former technician 5th grade who was mentioned by army investigators as being involved in the inquiry.
