Thompson, traveling freight agent for System, were in Klamath Falls Tuesday to meet with interested shippers from this area. Main aim of the trip, according to Sherrard, is to find out what the shippers of the Klamath area want and what they need, and to see in what ways System could be of added service to these men.

A subsidiary of Signal Oil company, System freight operates up and down the coast from Seattle to San Diego, and east to Texas points. System at the present time has an application before the ICC for permission to serve Klamath, but action is not expected on the application.

Investments by insurance companies would be welcomed, Knapp told the 77th annual commissioners' convention yesterday, but explained that insurance laws of many states must be amended to permit purchase of the "foreign securities."

"It was a fine woosh and whistle," Cohn told police, "but it came too late. The bandits had taken \$135 and two suits before the valve popped."

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## Lamott Files For KUHS Post

Robert H. Lamott, Boy Scout director for the Modoc Area council, has filed his candidacy for membership of the Klamath Union high school board from Altamont district. The vacancy was created by the resignation of Paul Sken, and will be voted on June 24. Lamott filed last night, according to the city school office, and is so far unopposed for the post.

Scott Warren is the only northern district candidate filed for the other vacancy on the school board. Other candidates may file for either of these positions until June 14.

The deadline is past for candidates wishing to file on school board No. 1, and Howard Barnhisel and Jack Schulze remain the only candidates for the two vacant positions. The deadline was June 10, with the election to be held on June 17.

## Wife Of Navy Man Dies Aboard Plane

LONG BEACH, Calif., June 12 (AP)—Mrs. Norma Jean Smalley, 21-year-old mother of three children, died yesterday aboard a navy transport plane that was bringing her here from Seattle for treatment for myelogenous leukemia, dread blood disease.

With her on the plane were the children and her husband, Chief Warrant Officer Bud Smalley, USN. They broke the news of her death to her mother, Mrs. Adah Nelson of Los Angeles, who was at the Los Alamitos naval air station, waiting for the plane.

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## Subsidies Denied OPA Meat Violators

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—The OPA will withhold subsidy payments from any meat slaughterer who violates maximum price regulations, District Enforcement Attorney Cecilia Gallagher said today.

The attorney said OPA's campaign against above-ceiling payments for livestock would continue despite the ruling of U. S. District Judge Claude McCulloch which declared OPA regulation 574 on livestock ceilings "void and unworkable."

## GOP Women Ask OPA End

Abolishment of price control by OPA was advocated in a resolution adopted by the Council of Oregon Republican Women in Klamath Falls last weekend and announced today. The group held that production is important and the best stimulus to production is fair competition with only a minimum of government supervision.

Other resolutions favored disbursement of school funds under state as opposed to federal authority; opposed socialization of medicine; favored dismissal of non-essential government services and reduction of unnecessary personnel and overhead.

Members of the resolutions committee included Lucile M. O'Neill, Alice T. Howard and Harriett E. Monroe.

## LAST TIME TONITE

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## Lumber Supply Will Increase

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—Priority-free lumber will be available to the public in considerable quantity from dealers' and distributors' stocks, Fred H. Brundage, western log and lumber administration, said today.

A new CPA regulation directs all sawmills to allocate 50 per cent of their production to house-construction lumber, he said—a boost from 40 per cent—but any produced in excess of that may be sold without priorities.

This, he said, should free about 25 per cent of dealers' and distributors' supplies for sale to persons lacking priorities. Its principal effect, he said, would be to ease restrictions on small jobs and repairs.

Douglas fir mills with facilities for producing only timbers and planks may appeal to the Portland office to obtain exemption from the housing-construction lumber requirement.

Seasoning will be required under a rule change which says that lumber "will not be considered as produced until seasoned

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for the customer's period," he pointed out. Previously green lumber was moved from the mills.

Mills and distributors must hold their production until the last day of the month before selling; to uncertified buyers, Brundage said.
