

Dunsmuir Railroad Fete To Greet Returned Vets

Dunsmuir's Railroaders are preparing to greet a record crowd on Saturday and Sunday, June 15 and 16 for their first Railroad Celebration since 1941.

Financed by the railroaders and businessmen of Dunsmuir, the celebration will be the official welcome-home party for Northern California and Southern Oregon veterans.

Features of the two-day event will include an all-night free street dance, a carnival, baseball games, two parades, and entertainment by the 6-piece Southern Pacific Club Band of San Francisco.

Accompanying the San Franciscans will be Miss Adele Healy, former state baton twirling champion. One of her specialties is twirling three batons at the same time.

Climax of the fete will come on Sunday morning, June 16, when the celebration's grand parade will be staged. Several thousand spectators are expected to witness the many colorful floats, bands, drill teams, mounted units and other groups. A total of \$400 in prizes will be awarded to winners in the various parade competitions.

Cavemen in Parade

Leading the parade will be veterans and veterans organizations from every part of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland. The west's most colorful organization, the Cavemen of Grants Pass, will be there clad in bearskins and armed with their primitive two days at Dunsmuir.

Norman Green, president of the celebration, announces that the gala affair is planned solely for the purpose of having a good time and urges everyone to don their overalls and come to Dunsmuir on June 15 and 16.

J. W. Corbett, general manager of the Southern Pacific company, and Mrs. Corbett, both of whom are former Dunsmuirites, will be among the many guests of the celebration.

Guest speaker for the occasion will be Mr. George P. Smith of San Francisco, official representative of SP President A. T. Meier.

Radio stations KVCV of Redding, and KFLW of Klamath Falls, Oregon will broadcast the various special events during the two days at Dunsmuir.

Miss Adele Healy, a well-known majorette who will participate in the grand parade, has made over 100 appearances under the auspices of the USO in various army and navy installations, hospitals and ports of embarkation during the war.

The Klamath County chamber of commerce is still maintaining its home reservation service here, although the number of vacancies listed has fallen off considerably since the end of the war. Charles R. Stark, chamber secretary said today.

Many people still inquire at the chamber of commerce for help in locating housing, about 500 queries a month, and the majority of them come from veterans.

The number of calls for housing listed is not so great now as during the war years, Stark said, probably because the population is becoming more stable, but many persons asking about rentals are in desperate need of housing.

The chamber of commerce wants listings of vacant houses, rooms and apartments, but does not handle sales of property.

Insurance Men Offer Models

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13 (AP)—A series of model insurance bills for use of state legislatures, or insurance commissioners where laws are not required, were approved in final sessions of the 77th convention of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners here.

The delegates today visited Bonneville dam after closing business meetings with elections last night.

The model bills would regulate rates for casualty and surety and fire, marine and inland marine insurance which the U. S. supreme court ruled is subject to the Sherman anti-trust act.

Robert E. Dineen, insurance

commissioner of New York, was elected president. Seth B. Thompson, insurance commissioner of Oregon, was named vice president.

Sprague River Man Will Get Discharge
