The persons named in the other two open indictments returned by the grand jury yesterday, Clyde Edward Todd for voluntary manslaughter, and Robert Ferris for rape, are both on bond and will not be arraigned until District Attorney Clarence A. Humble returns from Medford, where he is conducting a suit in federal court.

Klamath River Issue Studied

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13 (AP)—No conclusions or recommendations have been reached in plans to divert Klamath river waters to the Sacramento basin, but "the whole thing is in a study status," a spokesman for the army engineers said today.

Hearings on the plan were held some time ago at Klamath Falls, Yreka, and Sacramento.

The spokesman said "The desires of local interests of course are most important in problems of that nature."

He explained that the flood control act approved by congress Dec. 22, 1944, made it mandatory that all investigations be conducted so local interests could be kept informed, with government of effected states having an opportunity to review the reports.

He said a bureau of reclamation office had been established at Klamath Falls to make a survey of the Klamath basin, this being one of many things which must be completed before any final conclusions are reached.

Remodeled Jewelry Store Open To Public Saturday

Resembling a giant jewel box, Ricky's new jewelry store will be open to the public Friday at 7 p. m. The completely remodeled store uses all the latest display methods and mechanical features.

The entire jewelry store interior will be on view from the street through full-length 10-foot circular glass windows at the front and side. The interior is done in glass and rainbow granite.

Inside the floors are covered with soft green carpet. Display counters of walnut and glass are placed about the show room with a circular revolving glass show case just behind the tall windows in front.

Counters and walls are constructed of highly polished natural American walnut paneling with tall mirrors lining sections of the walls.

The interior is designed on a circular plan off which the stairway to the downstairs store leads. In the main show room, four types of soft, indirect lighting are employed so that all wall surfaces and display cases are free of shadows. A large concealed circular section of rose and white neon lighting throws a soft light from the ceiling. Hidden in the walnut concealed circular section of lighting which illuminates walls. Small circular lights in the ceiling add to the soft overall effect, and brighter lights are used in the display cases.

The winding stairway leading off the main show room is carpeted in the same light green, with walls of walnut reeding. The downstairs store where household appliances, radios, and similar equipment will be featured is done in a color scheme and design harmonizing with the jewelry store above.

The jewelry repair shop is located downstairs as well as a new feature, a shop where jewelry will be made to order.

The large air conditioning units are situated behind the downstairs store. Heat from the lights throughout the store is utilized for heating, and drawn away from the lights for cooling.

During the remodeling Ricky's Jewelry store has been temporarily located at 8th and Main.

Senate Again Upholds OPA

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The senate killed today a proposal to strip OPA immediately of almost all its price controls except those over rents and minerals.

The action, by roll call vote of 51 to 21, came in rejecting an amendment by Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) to the OPA extension bill.

Thomas' proposal specified that price controls be lifted from "timber, petroleum, cotton, milk, livestock, including sheep and wool, tobacco, poultry, fish and shellfish, grain, peanuts, fruits and vegetables, or any product processed in whole or substantial part therefrom."

The group coupled with that decision a recommendation that congress follow up a veto by:

1. Adopting a resolution continuing the present price control law without change;
2. Approving without change the OPA appropriation recommended by the budget bureau.
