Cards Not Necessary For Labor Reporters

ASTORIA, June 14 (AP)—News reporters ought not to be required to have union cards for admittance to labor convention meetings, the Oregon Federation of Labor believes.

Such restriction "is hardly in accord with our demand for a free press," an approved statement by the resolutions committee said. The statement accompanied a recommendation for voting down a Klamath Falls district proposal.

"No complaint has been heard of unfairness in reporting this convention," the statement said, "and we believe that is the grow-

ing tendency of newspaper reporting generally. But even if reporters at times are unjust, the remedy is not to increase their prejudices by discrimination."

Truman Mulls OPA Extension

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Handed a resounding defeat in congress on the issue of price controls, President Truman left open today the question of whether he would veto the OPA extension bill.

He declined to commit himself when he was asked outright at his news conference whether he would sign or disapprove the measure as it passed the senate last night.

The senate approved a year's extension of OPA—shorns, however, of much authority and minus the right to keep price controls on meat, eggs, milk, butter and chickens.

Mr. Truman said he couldn't answer the veto question before he saw the legislation in its final form, after it had been worked out by a senate-house committee adjusting the different versions of bills passed by the two houses.

R. A. Zeitler Dies Suddenly

Mr. Zeitler lived here for nearly 15 years. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Zeitler of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

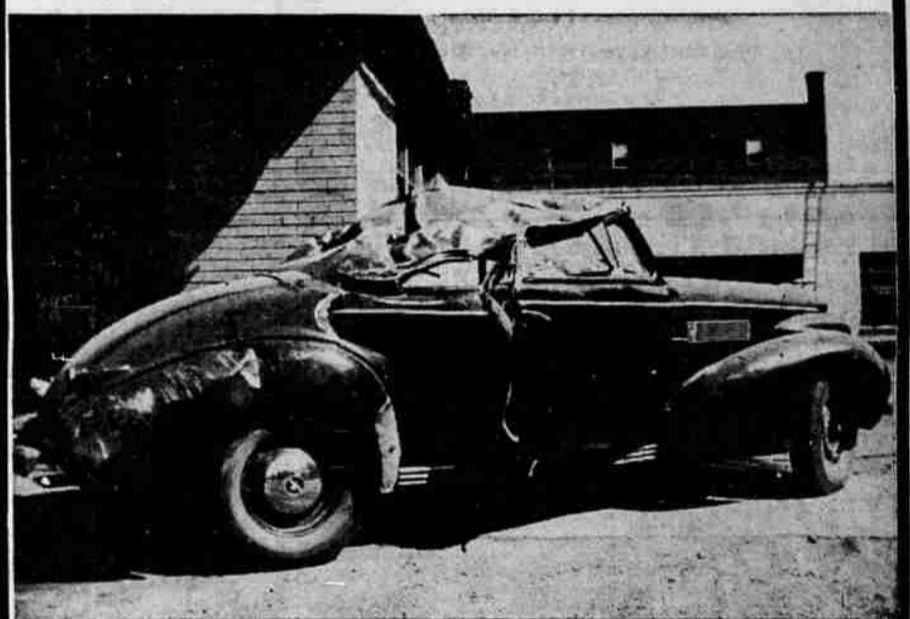

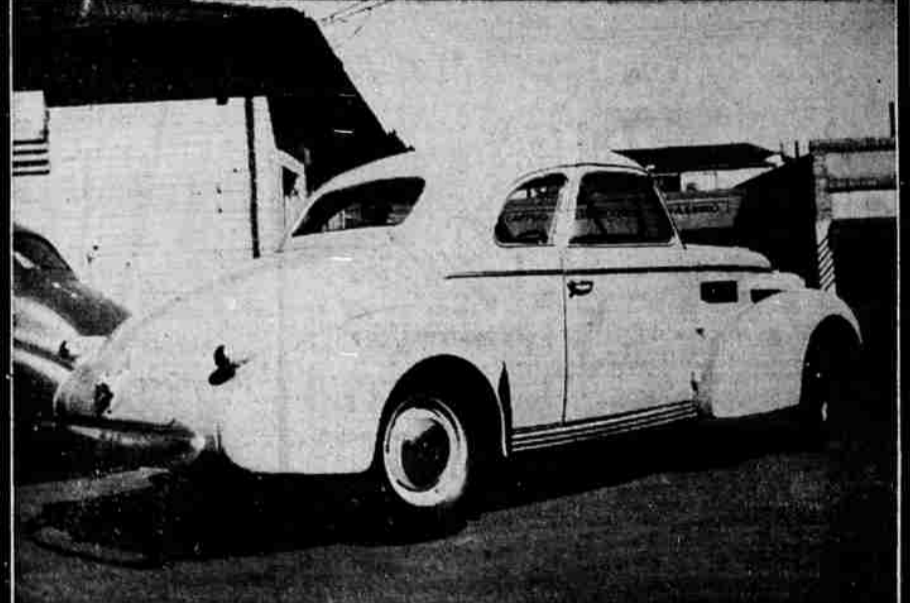
