GREENWOOD LAKE, N. J., June 14 (AP) — Joe Louis could just as well be a guy fishing in a sump in Siam, for all the attention Billy Conn gives him and what he does or how he looks.

You practically have to drag any conversation about the Brown Bomber out of the Pittsburgh pretty boy, he's that unconcerned about the fellow generally regarded as packing the largest ether cans in his fists in our generation.

And as for thinking about Louis, once his daily clouting chores are done, Billy is interested only in the order of their importance, with (A) gin-rummy, (B) poker and (C) a little game of skill and chance known as "skin," which means you can be very well peeled playing it.

After a rest period Dusette got his full nelson but wasn't able to keep Angelo from stepping through the ropes. A few seconds later he got it again but the Italian again stepped out of bounds.

Then Martino clamped on a headlock and smothered that was virtually a choke, flung Dusette into the ropes, back to the choke, again into the ropes until Referee Wally Moss finally gave Georges the fall on a disqualification because Angelo refused to heed warnings about illegal tactics.

Martino, and Paavo Katonen who was in his corner, protested the decision loudly but it stuck. Over in Dusette's corner Joe Lynn advised Georges to go in for rabbit punches and Dusette followed suit.

Martino changed his style slightly and battered Dusette by jamming his head into the turnbuckle, but Georges Dusette kept hacking away at the back of the Italian's neck until he sought solace outside the ropes. Joe Lynn, on the outside, drove him back into the ring and Dusette slid around him for a full nelson and the match.

While Dusette was being formally presented the junior heavy belt, Angelo and Katonen started a brawl with Referee Wally Moss which soon involved the new champ and Lynn, plus radio announcers, ring officials and spectators, but the riot was quelled and Dusette left the ring with his title.

In addition to the championship festivities there were two other preliminary battles last night. In the opener Bob Kenston and Jack Kiser scrambled to a draw, one fall each, and in the semi Joe Lynn was awarded a third fall and the match on a disqualification over Paavo Katonen.

## Scarsella Hits 16th Four-Baser For Oaks

Mighty Les Scarsella, Oakland first baseman who says his greatest thrill is hitting a homer, today emerged from a pitcher-worrying spree in the Pacific Coast Baseball league with his 16th blood tingle, a clout that put him ahead of the field of circuit sluggers.

The heavy hitter's game-tying blow in the eighth inning last night helped the Oakland club to a 3-2 victory over the Sacramento Solons to maintain its two-game margin at the top of

the loop. It broke a tie for home run honors with Los Angeles' powerful Lloyd Christopher, who has failed to pole one to the fence this week.

Brooks Holder also delivered one of the league's five round trips in three games last night and singled home the winning tally for Oakland in the ninth frame. Ruggier Ardizola was the winning pitcher, allowing the Solons eight hits.

Fain Pounds One Ferris Fain, first baseman of the second-place San Francisco Seals, who normally chokes the bat and says he's off the heavy slugging, slammed out a four-bagger and batted in half his team's runs for a 6-5 victory in a 12-inning marathon with the Portland Beavers. It was the 321 hitter's fourth homer of the season.

Sal Tamina, San Francisco left fielder, got on the home-run bandwagon with his first of the season. The Beavers pounded three pitchers for 11 hits, scoring all their runs in an explosive fourth inning. Al Lien, who took over the mound for the Seals in the ninth and finished the job, notched his fourth win of the year.

Swede Jensen's two-run homer in the second inning put the San Diego Padres out in front to stay for a 4-1 win over the Hollywood Stars. Al Olsen limited the Stars to four hits and marked up his tenth win against five losses.

He snuffed out the first nine batters to face him. The Padres attacked the offerings of Art Cuccurullo, Ronnie Smith and Johnny Blitner for 12 safeties.
