## Italian Crisis Seems Subsid

ROME, June 15 (AP)—As fast as it blew up, Italy's political crisis apparently has blown over today.

Apparently in deference to the wishes of Interior Minister Giuseppe Romita, there were no celebrations of the king's departure or of the defacto advent of the republic.

## Guerrillas Clash In Philippines

CABANATUAN, Luzon, June 15 (AP)—Fifteen peasants were reported slain and five wounded today in renewed clashes at three points in Nueva Ecija province, where the new Philippine agrarian commission is attempting to settle prolonged domestic unrest.

Governor Isabelo Castaneda said municipal authorities reported battles between civil guards, Hukbalahap guerrillas and rival Usafte guerrillas at the village of San Felipe, Kabaulihan and Camadag, all within 25 miles of this central Luzon provincial capital.

## Mrs. Shattuck Dies At Age 89

Mrs. Theodocia Earnest Shattuck, pioneer resident of Klamath and Jackson counties, died Friday morning in Klamath Falls after an illness of three years. Born in Charlton county, Missouri, in 1857, she came with her mother and brothers to Oregon in 1871. The family settled in Jackson county, 17 miles from Jacksonville. Mrs. Shattuck, then Theodocia E. Culbertson, attended public schools there and taught in the county for about five years.

In 1882 she married Solon Shattuck, who was a pioneer homesteader in Fort Klamath. After their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Shattuck lived in Fort Klamath, in a short time they moved to his homestead of 160 acres. Later they bought 50 acres near the town and Mr. Shattuck gave two acres of the land for a store, which was the first building in what is now Fort Klamath. They raised stock and ran a dairy until they came to Klamath Falls in 1912, where they purchased a home on North 11th street. After living here for one year they moved to a 40-acre ranch just off the old Fort Klamath road. Mr. Shattuck died there in 1915. While Mrs. Shattuck lived at the ranch she made butter which she sold to customers in Klamath Falls and the Agency.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Clara May Colman of Klamath Falls; one son, Obil S. Shattuck of Richland, Wash.; one sister, Mrs. Fred Loosley of Fort Klamath, Ore.; one brother, James Culbertson of Central Point, Ore.; eight grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

## Alaskan Party Off On Good Will Tour

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, June 15 (AP)—Territorial Gov. Ernest Gruening and 21 Anchorage businessmen will leave by plane at 4 a. m. tomorrow on a good-will tour which they term "a search for a direct trade route to the east," ala Christopher Columbus.

During the trip, the plane will make overnight stops at Chicago, Fargo, Minneapolis, Great Falls and Edmonton. A highlight of their two-day Chicago visit will be the planting of the flag of Alaska at the intersection of State and Madison streets, terminus of their round-trip.

## Steel Railroad Strike Ended

PITTSBURGH, June 15 (AP)—Its railroad strike ended by government seizure, the Jones and Laughlin Steel corporation's big Pittsburgh plant was back in operation today but officials said they do not expect to achieve normal production for another four days.

The five-day strike of 250 trainmen of the Monongahela connecting railroad, which serves the J. and L. mill, ended abruptly last night as soldiers arrived in trucks from the Carlisle, Pa., barracks "to furnish protection to workers whose services might be required."

ABOARD USS MOUNT McKinley, Bikini, June 15 (AP)—Admiral Blandy, commander of Operation Crossroads, advised today that Secretary of Navy Forrestal tentatively plans to arrive at Bikini June 28.

A radio message said the secretary would probably be accompanied by an aide, Capt. William Smedberg, and not more than six other officers.

## Paul Carlson Passes At 81

Paul Casper Carlson, a resident of Klamath county for over 40 years, died Thursday, June 13, following an extended illness.

LONDON, June 15 (AP)—A new commercial air speed record for the Atlantic was classed today by Pan American World Airways as the clipper Bermuda landed at London airport 11 hours and eight minutes after leaving New York. A strong tail wind helped.

The Lockheed Constellation, with 39 passengers, averaged 316 miles an hour for the 3518-mile crossing. Pan American also claimed the previous record of 12 hours and eight minutes.

# Superfort Crew Selected To Drop First Bikini Bomb

ABOARD THE CROSSROADS FLAGSHIP, Mt. McKinley, June 15 (AP)—The Superfortress crew commanded by 30-year-old Maj. Woodrow P. Swancutt, will, barring accidents, drop the first atomic test bomb at Bikini lagoon next month.

The honor of being recommended for the assignment was won by Swancutt's crew in grueling competition with four other crack bomber crews at the 20th bomber command base at Kwajalein.

Brig. Gen. Roger M. Ramey, commander of the 20th, made the recommendation, final acceptance of which is being temporarily withheld by Maj. Gen. William A. Kepner, army chief of aviation in connection with the atomic tests.

"I will accept the lineup selection (of Swancutt's crew) after June 20, always considering as available the other crews if conditions necessitate a change," Kepner said aboard this flagship.
