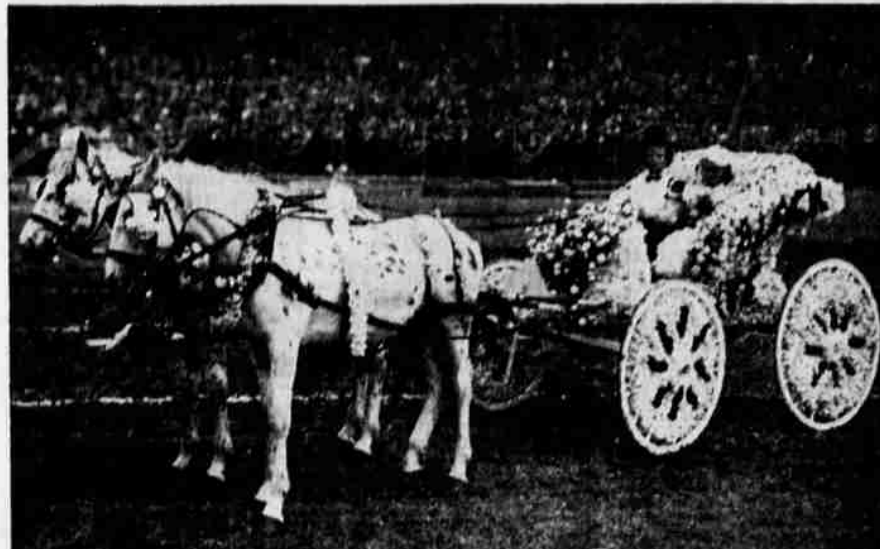
Joe Hicks, Klamath businessman, flew to Portland on Tuesday and returned on Wednesday. Joe reports a good trip both ways.

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Lanham Extension Pleases Schools

PORTLAND, June 15 (AP)—Portland school officials, learning the senate had approved extension of the Lanham act, said the federal funds would greatly help balance this city's school budget.

A substantial deficit confronted the school district after failure of plans to call a special tax election.

Willard B. Spalding, superintendent of schools, said it would not be known how much Portland's situation is improved "until we learn the amount we can expect to secure and review the budget." He reported the city would make application for about \$1,386,000, but said the federal works agency advised officials to expect a 30 per cent cut in estimates.

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CPA Refuses KF Applicant

PORTLAND, June 15 (AP)—Thirty-two applications for \$435,550 worth of construction were denied yesterday by the Oregon district CPA construction review committee.

Application to build a \$500,000 Creston school building to replace one destroyed by fire, was filed by Portland city schools.

Approvals: West Salem, Oregon Flax Textiles, Inc., \$18,000 to erect quonset hut for flax tow cleaning plant.

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Two In County Die From Tuberculosis

Figures released by the Oregon state board of health show there were two deaths from tuberculosis in Klamath county during the month of April. Two new cases of tuberculosis were reported in this county during the week ending June 1.

The Klamath County Public Health association will bring to Klamath county next fall the chest X-ray mobile unit. Izola J. Parker, executive secretary for the health association has announced the appointment of Charles B. Larkin as chairman of the case finding project.

The committee is being organized throughout the county so that maximum use may be made of the time that the mobile unit is here.

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
