

KLAMATH SONS LASH McCLOUD NINE, 7-4

Disregarding cold weather, a little rain and wet grounds, the Klamath Sons yesterday afternoon turned back the McCLOUD Loggers 7, 4, at Recreation field before approximately 800 baseball fans who disregarded cold weather, etc., to come out to see the local nine in their second home game of the season.

The Klamath boys jumped on McCLOUD hurler Warren Berg for two hits and two runs in the very first inning and added two more tallies on three hits in the third to lead all the way, although the Loggers gave a big push in the sixth and seventh to come up close, 5-4.

Klamath had added one run in the fifth inning, then in the last of the seventh beat out four singles for two more scores and the victory, their fourth in five Northern California league games.

Oakland's Sunday losses were by scores of 4-3 and 5-3. Billy Ramsey, Sac centerfielder, scored the winning run in the opener. He singled in the ninth, went to second on an infield out and scored on Joe Marty's single to center.

Three Oak errors decided the seven-inning nipout in the fourth frame. The Oaks defeated Sacramento 2-1 Saturday in a well-played game.

Beavers Dive Twice
At Portland, the Seals won the Sunday double bill, 6-4 and 8-5. The Saturday game was rained out.

Los Angeles finished a successful week with Sunday wins of 8-7 and 3-2, after a 6-1 victory over Seattle Saturday. The opener went 11 innings and the nipout one over the customary seven. George Archie, former Seattle toiler, punched the single that broke up the opener and scored the winning run in the nipout.

Hollywood and San Diego split Sunday, the Padres winning the opener behind the veterans Tom Seals 9-4, and Frankie Dasso, former San Diego pitcher recently acquired by Hollywood winning the second game for the Stars, 3-0. The Saturday game went to Hollywood, 7-4.

This week while the Seals play Seattle, San Diego's Padres go to Oakland, Sacramento to Hollywood and the Angels to Portland.

Jones Captures Rifle Honors
PORTLAND, June 17 (AP)—Jerry Jones, Klamath Falls, scored a near-perfect 1396 out of a possible 1400 yesterday to capture top honors in the Oregon gun club's annual small bore outdoor rifle tournament.

Jones' score was the second highest ever recorded in the event here. Runner-up was Robert Calhoun, Springfield, with 1394. Louis Brentlinger, Portland, scored 1392.

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Don't Call Him A Kid

CLEVELAND, June 17 (AP)—They won't be calling him "Ray Mangrum's kid brother" around the golfing circuit any more—for now he's the National Open champion.

In one of the most startling finishes the links classic has ever witnessed, Lloyd Mangrum of Los Angeles, a Texas-born farm boy, snatched golf's biggest prize yesterday over Canterbury Golf club's storm-menaced layout in a double playoff with Byron Nelson of Toledo and Vic Ghezzi of Knoxville, Tenn.

They had tied Saturday at 284, four under par, for the regulation 72 holes, and in the first playoff round yesterday morning they came in like a three-horse team with par 72s, forcing another round.

More Experience

Mis-Match Averted
But the changes are working out for the best in that Knock is an experienced and popular boy here and the impending weight differential between Pete Gordon and DeVore is eliminated.

The other two bouts, both four rounders, are unchanged as this goes to press. Bobby Barnette of Sprague River will fight Don Reynolds, and Herbert Snell of Sprague River will tangle with Paul Wilson. Both are lightweight duels.

Bobby Feller racked up his 11th win in the first game on Hank Edwards' single that scored Felix Mackiewicz. Blazing Bob struck out nine to boost his season total to 145 in 135 innings.
