government troops to Manchuria and given their weapons.
(These sources declared that U. S. aid to the Nanking government while peace negotiations were in progress was "an unfriendly gesture to the Chinese people.")
On the other hand, Li Sien-

liang, mayor of Tsingtao, urged United States forces here to commit themselves to the defense of the city, saying that would deter the communists.
Li declared that the marines arrived last October not only to disarm and repatriate Japanese but to establish a far-eastern naval base.

MEDFORD, June 19 (AP)—Clair Colby, 31, died in a hospital here last night of a head injury received when struck by a snag in logging operations near Trail.
Colby was carried by stretcher a half mile to the nearest logging road and brought here. A native of Brandon, he was a World War II veteran.

Court Feud Brings Plea For Changes

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—Demands that four Roosevelt appointees be swept from the supreme court were coupled today with a proposal that all eight justices tell the full story of the tribunal's "feud."
Senator Eastland (D-Miss.) announced his intention to push for an open investigation of discord between the justices which he claimed has produced "inexcusable chaos" in the high court.
The suggestion that all present justices be called on for public testimony came as a follow-up to the move by Eastland and Senator Bridges (R-N.H.) aimed at virtual dismissal of half the present court.
Eastland told a reporter he will ask the senate judiciary committee to question the justices at hearings he insists be held on the constitutional amendment he and Bridges introduced.
Forced Retirement
The amendment would force retirement of four of the present justices by limiting to three the number of court members who could hold appointment by any one president. The places of those retiring would be filled temporarily by house election of lower court judges until a new president chose successors.
The amendment faces an admittedly hard road. To become effective it must win two-thirds approval by congress, then ratification by three-fourths of the state legislatures. Most senators doubted it could make the grade.
If it did, however, it would leave on the court Justices Hugo L. Black, Stanley F. Reed, Felix Frankfurter and Harold H. Burton, the latter appointed by President Truman. It would remove Justices William O. Douglas, Frank Murphy, Robert H. Jackson and Wiley Rutledge, as the final four appointees of the late President Roosevelt.
It would not affect President Truman's appointment of Fred Vinson as chief justice, a nomination expected to receive early senate confirmation.
Eastland informed a reporter he is uninterested in the fact that his amendment would leave Hugo Black on the court, while retiring Jackson, who recently asserted publicly that Black declined to disqualify himself in a case in which his former law partner was interested.

Casualties Heavy In German Blast

HANOVER, Germany, June 19 (AP)—More than 100 Germans and displaced persons are believed to have lost their lives in an explosion which followed a fire in an ammunition dump at Haemigsen, 15 miles northwest of Hanover, yesterday.
All types of German ammunition had been stored in an old salt mine on three levels at 40, 70 and 100 feet below the surface.
The ammunition was being removed but it was estimated that 10,000 tons of explosives were still in the mine at the time of the blast.
At the time of the explosion 80 Germans and 23 displaced persons were working underground. All were believed to have been lost.
The whole area was evacuated by British troops immediately. Rescue squads are standing by to enter the mine as soon as possible.
