H. L. Clevenger Passes At Hilt

YREKA, June 19—Herbert L. Clevenger, 58, of Hill, a former resident of Klamath Falls, died suddenly Monday afternoon, June 17, at his home. His death was attributed to a heart ailment from which he had suffered for some time, though he had been able to work until noon Monday.

Prior to moving to Hill 14 years ago, Mr. Clevenger, a native of Palmira, Ill., where he was born February 19, 1888, had made his home in Klamath Falls, Medford and Weed, following lumbering.

He was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose, Lodge No. 1106, in Klamath Falls. Survivors include his widow, Lillie B. Clevenger of Hill; four daughters, Mrs. Leona Puckett of Keno, Ore., Mrs. May Melching of Klamath River, Calif., Mrs. Evelyn DeAvilla of Hill and Mrs. Elizabeth Jorgensen of Berkeley, Calif.; two sons, Roy Clevenger of Medford and Walter Clevenger of Keno. There are ten grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Thursday, June 20, at 2 p. m. from Girdner's funeral chapel in Yreka with the Rev. Hartzell E. Buckner officiating. Interment was in Evergreen cemetery at Yreka.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, June 19 (AP)—The first "barnyard on wheels" has reached Anchorage over the long Alaska highway. Two families from Spokane, Wash., brought a cow, a calf and 40 chickens, and the populace along the wilderness route was as bug-eyed as though a circus had come to town.

Mr. and Mrs. Clark Peterson, who brought three children with them to homestead near Anchorage, said that at Whitehorse, Y. T., many of the residents never had seen a cow. They estimated 1500 people rallied round during a two-day stop to watch the milk. Children flocked around the chicken pens for the sight of a fresh egg. The hens were showmen. They produced eight eggs.

Many Veterans Still Seeking for Homes
SALEM, June 19 (AP)—Sixty per cent of all married war veterans who were discharged last December still were looking for places to live in April, the state department of Veterans affairs said today.

Forty per cent of these veterans were living with relatives, and another 20 per cent were living in cramped, unsuitable quarters. Those seeking homes were evenly divided between those who want to rent and those who want to buy.

PORTLAND, June 19 (AP)—Construction applications for a \$300,000 glucose plant at The Dalles and a \$70,000 meat packing plant at Oregon City were on file today at the Oregon office of civilian production administration.

The office announced rejection of 22 requests totaling \$282,685 and approved of 14 buildings totaling \$135,200.

The glucose plant at The Dalles will be erected by the Northwest Chemurgy Co-op. Inc., to process surplus low grade wheat and potatoes. The meat packing plant is planned by the Oregon Livestock Cooperative at Oregon City.
