Blaze Blamed On Fishermen

Fishermen were believed to be the cause of the forest fire which broke out in the canyon of the north fork of Sprague river yesterday afternoon. Fishing equipment found near the area of the fire indicated the possible source of the flames which burned over two acres.

The fire, which was spotted at 3:55 p. m., was brought under control at 5:30 by fighters from the Klamath protective patrol station in Bly and from Weyerhaeuser camp No. 6.

The canyon fire was the eleventh reported so far this year. With hot weather the forests are drying out rapidly and H. H. Ogle of the Klamath fire protective association warns people entering the forests to be careful of throwing away burning material.
