Farmer Slays Rat Horde In Battle To Save Flock

SACRAMENTO, June 22 (AP)—Adolph Bufo, Wilton farmer, counted 820 dead large rats today following a fantastic day and night battle reminiscent of the middle ages.
 Aided only by a dog, two cats, a can of poison and a club, Bufo said he struggled a day and night to save his flock of 50 chickens from the "invaders" and, though exhausted at the end of the fight, he said he was successful.
 Bufo said he was working in his ranch yard when he glanced over a hay field and beheld a sight "the like of which I had never seen before."
 "Coming up the hill across the hay field was a gray horde of rats—first singly, then by two's and three's, and then in droves," he said.
 "Not bothering to go around the hay shocks, but over them, they headed straight for my ranch buildings."
 Bufo said he ran into a chicken bath, emptied all the feed from the hoppers, and substituted a quick-acting rat poison, then armed himself with a club. The rats ignored Bufo, his dog and cats, and swarmed into the hoppers, devouring the poisoned food. They were soon running around crazily, Bufo said, and he went to work on them with the club, while the dog and cats chewed them.
 All day and night they fought, with wave after wave of rats appearing. Suddenly the migration stopped.
 Bufo believes the rats, starved by the current feed shortage, had sent out scouts and picked his ranch as a promising spot for food.

Fire Department Planned By Klamath Suburbanites

The south and east suburban area of Klamath Falls will soon have a fire department of its own if plans of the Suburban League and Grange materialize. Both organizations have taken definite action and have instructed their respective executive committees to take immediate steps to circulate petitions and take other legal action for the formation of the district.
 The Suburban League at its meeting Friday devoted its entire business session to the discussion on a resolution which pledges the league in initiating such action as will be necessary to form a fire protection district and welcomes cooperation of the Grange and other organizations and individuals to this end.
 The group suggests that representatives of all interested organizations and any interested individual meet with the league to make plans for the formation of the proposed fire protection district.
 At its meeting the league planned a special session for Friday, June 28, at 8 p. m., at Shasta school to which all residents of the suburb will be invited to lay plans for the proposed district and to appoint committees to see that petitions are circulated. It is expected the state fire marshal will be present at this special meeting.

Newsman Tells Papers' Duty

GEARHART, June 22 (AP)—A Syracuse, N. Y., speaker told the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' association, its convention that for any newspaper to disregard matters of national import is "an utter fallacy of its right of existence."
 William J. Oertel, acting director of a weekly newspaper bureau, said the newspapers had a "sacred duty" to give their readers sound interpretation and constructive criticism.
 A Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company official, Stanley Bacon of Portland, said telephone hook-ups with automobiles would enable the reporters of tomorrow to get direct tongue-lashings from the city desk.
 Will Henry, manager of the Dairy Cooperative association, Portland, criticized the new deal, calling the Roosevelt administration "the great betrayer of constitutional government."

 Half the trees were broken so far above the ground they cannot be used, officials reported. Nearly a million feet of Ponderosa pine were flattened.
