

# Badgers Should Cop Crew Race

SEATTLE, June 22 (AP)—Uncle Sam's weatherman and navy aviators held out hope today that clearing skies would give eight collegiate eight-oared crews when they compete over the 2000-meter distance for the national sprint championship at 5 p. m. (PST).

"Cloudy in the morning, clearing in the afternoon," was the latest word, after earlier forecasts called for intermittent rains and up to moderate southwest winds.

A crowd of close to 200,000 was expected to jam-pack its way along the lakeshore to watch the race.

Stringing along with the champion, the consensus rested with the undefeated Badgers from Wisconsin to win, despite all the deprecating that Coach Allen Walsch could muster. He slammed his husky sweaters through three workouts in 18 hours after arriving late Thursday evening, and said he hoped they were fit for the race.

He did a bit of wondering late yesterday afternoon. The 1936 University of Washington Olympic champions tucked themselves into their old title-winning boat, the "Husky Clipper," for a reunion cruise, and for awhile at a 20 beat, managed to keep even with the Badgers.

But when Bobby Moch, the "36 cox," called for a big ten, his puffing blade-pullers just didn't have it and Wisconsin sailed away.

All crews but Rutgers and Washington held double workouts yesterday. Coach Chuck Logg of Rutgers has been chucking to himself ever since that Wednesday time trial which rumor now has it was a flashy 6:05, or 10 seconds faster than the next best performance—by the University of Washington's green oarsmen.

Nevertheless there were many who were picking Washington regardless. Coach Al Ulbrichson bemoaned this, but did say that "given another three weeks of conditioning, I think we could win it." His Huskies have only been rowing two and a half months.

The best opening day performance by a "name" player was the three-under-par 69 off the clubs of Clayton Heafner, big Charlotte, N. C., pro with the dapper mustache, who finished in a 12th-place tie in the U. S. open. He shot five birdies, three of them on the tough second nine.

Harold West, the pudgy defending champion from Portland, Ore., had no success on the greens and took 75. Leo Diegel, veteran linksman from Tucson, Ariz., also carded a 76.

The 70-shooters were Emery Zimmerman, Portland pro, who has won the Utah event twice; Paul Jones, Whittier, Calif., and Dale Anderson, Long Beach, Calif.

The list of the 10 subpar shooters was completed by George Schneider, Ogden, Utah, pro with three Utah crowns to his credit; Bobby Litton, The Dalles, Ore., professional, and Ed Kingsley, Salt Lake City amateur, with 71 apiece.

# Fishin' Dope

What yesterday's flash flood and hailstorm has done to the fishery is up to the angler to figure out for himself, but personally we have never had any luck with anything but catfish after a storm.

But we have no theory about storms about storms about fish and there are plenty of people who figure trout are going to bite after a rain, and they may be right.

Matt Finnigan, for one, figures that fishing is going to be pretty good generally this weekend and is going to get better the rest of this month. Diamond lake in particular has been a disappointment to some folks but should improve right along now. Some catches have been made on the bottom with single eggs for bait.

Lake o' the Woods, according to varying reports has been good to fair with flashers and worms for trout and for bass on plugs. Trout up to 10 inches and some bass as big as four pounds.

Klamath river, due to close July 5, is still good for most any kind of fishing with most any kind of lure. Lost river, the home of catfish and perch, is due to become legally open again July 1 after being closed for two months.

Up north Crescent lake has been reported good on trolls, and a lot of Klamath people have been going up to the big Deschutes. South Twin lake in Deschutes county, into which some 18,000 legal trout were dumped a couple of months ago, will open June 29.

This year as last the game commission is going to count the fish taken out of South Twin, looking for the marked ones which were put in this spring. The bag limit is five fish, not to exceed 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 10 fish and not to exceed 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days.

Trolling in the Upper Lake at the mouth of Wood river has been okay with flashers and worms, and the mouth of Williamson likewise. Just inside the Williamson some bait fishing with cluster eggs could be tried.

We know a person who is resting uneasily until the time when he can toss a hook into Crater lake where Bert Robu figures there must be some monster after a four-year quiet period, but from the looks of the show up there, that's still several weeks in the future.
