Miller, a left-hander, allowed the Railroaders only five hits in nine full innings, and himself batted in all four of Klamath's runs. Bones Coon, Dunsmuir manager and pitcher, was topped for just seven hits.

Up to the sixth inning it was zero to zero in a very tightly played ball game, then the Railroaders edged in their lone tally when Miller momentarily relaxed and walked two men in a row. Ronald Behnke, Dunsmuir shortstop, singled to left, scoring Miles Richmond from second.

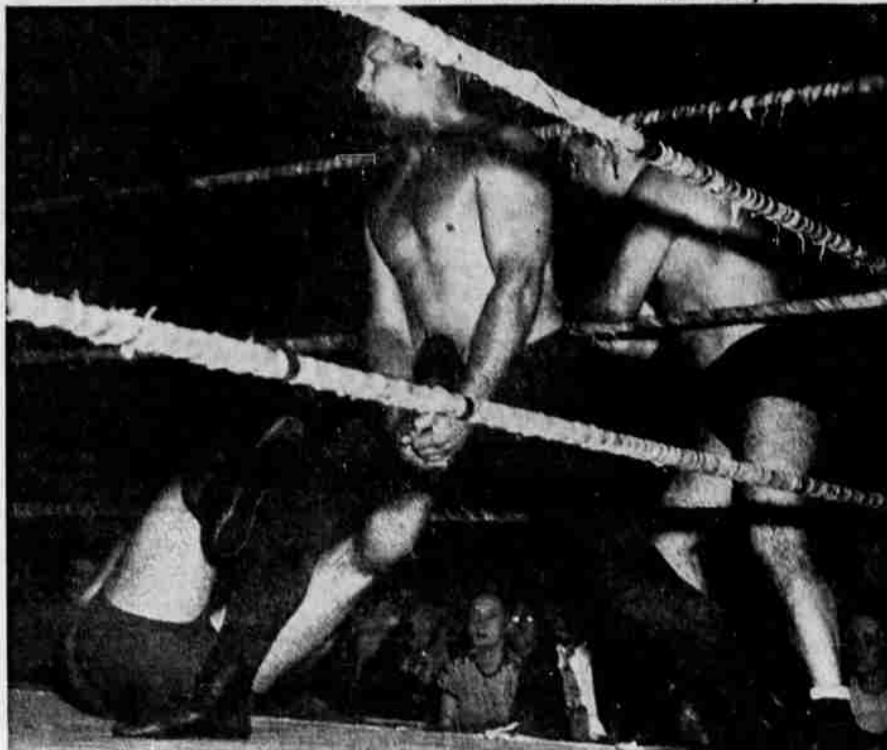

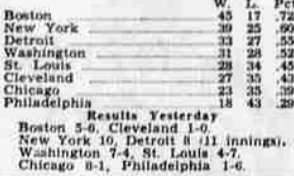

PADRES EDGE BEVOS TWICE

San Diego did it the hard way, but when the dust had cleared from yesterday's eight Pacific Coast league baseball games only the Padres from down south had done anything to improve their position in the campaign.

San Diego shaded the Portland Beavers, 1-0 and 3-2 in two extra-inning contests. The other six teams, including the front-running Oakland A's and second place San Francisco Seals, divided double bills.

The Padres, behind the pitching of Al Olson, stopped Portland 1-0 in the 12-inning first game when Pete Coscarart hit with the bases loaded and two out.

In the eighth-inning nightcap, scheduled for seven innings, Johnny Jensen scored the winning run in San Diego's 3-2 victory when Portland Shortstop

Lindsey Brown, who had fielded Del Ballinger's grounder cleanly, was knocked down by Third Baseman Glen Crawford, also trying to reach the ball.

Oakland exploded for seven runs, including Los Angeles' 5 to 2. Two of the homers were off Jess Doherty, who came in to relieve Red Lynn. The Angels came back in the second game, knocking Rugger Ardizzone out of the box in the third and going on to win 4 to 3.

Pinch Hitter Tommy O'Brien poked a grand slam homer over the leftfield fence to climax a riotous six-run inning which enabled Hollywood to beat San Francisco 8 to 7 in the second game when Pete Coscarart hit with the bases loaded and two out.

The Seals, ahead 4-1 going into the sixth, scored one in their half of the sixth and two more in the seventh, but the Stars put

on the clincher with another tally in the top half of the seventh.

Larry Jansen was the winning pitcher in the first game, which the Seals took, 6-2.

Sacramento and Seattle also drew a split series. In the first game Jerry Staley held the Rainiers to seven hits as the Solons won, 4 to 3. Seattle First Baseman Earl Torgerson, threw his arm out of joint and had to be relieved in that game.

Seattle came back to win the nightcap 5-4 behind the four-hit pitching of John Orphan.

In Saturday's games, Los Angeles beat Oakland 4-1, San Francisco edged out Hollywood 8 to 7, San Diego topped Portland 5 to 4 and Seattle defeated Sacramento 8 to 3.

In series opening Tuesday, Hollywood plays at Sacramento, Seattle at Oakland, Portland at Los Angeles and San Francisco at San Diego.

SEATTLE, June 24 (AP)—Most surprising finish of the Indian war canoe race in the pre-regatta program Saturday on Lake Washington was that of the St. Katherine, a Kuper Island, B. C., entry, which rallied to win fourth place after six of the 11-man crew washed overboard when the craft swamped.

Flashing to first place in the battle of the braves was the Mount Prevost of Duncan, B. C., which claimed a two-length victory over the Saanich tribe's No. 5 boat. Another Saanich craft, the Queston Mark, crossed the line third.

Portlander's Putter Cops \$1000 At Utah Golf Open

SALT LAKE CITY, June 24 (AP)—The comparative temperatures of putting blades helped to determine the Utah Open golf championship, tucked away today by Emery Zimmerman, steady-going Portland, Ore., pro and ex-G.I. along with the \$1000 top money.

Zimmerman, shooting the 72 holes of the \$5000 event over the upland Fort Douglas course in a commendable five-under-par 283, commented "My putter got hot."

On the other hand, Tal Smith, 26-year-old Alameda, Calif., amateur, who wound up third yesterday at 286 after pacing the field through the first 36 holes, complained "My putter left me."

And big blond Clayton Heafner, the Charlotte, N. C., professional, who took second prize of \$700 a strike behind Zimmerman, said he could have used some of those putts, that died close to the hole. "Very aggravating golf" was the drawing way the husky Carolinian described his play.

Zimmerman added this year's crown to two other Utah titles he won in pre-war times. He was back in the pack, five strokes behind the gallery favorite Smith, when Sunday's 36 holes opened on the wind-lashed up-and-down fairways.

The Oregon pro drove into the lead at the 54-hole stage with a fine 69, three under par, one shot ahead of Smith, and clinched the victory with an afternoon 71 knowing he needed only a par four on the home hole to beat Heafner, who closed with a well-earned 69.

Troeh Takes Pacific Handicap Trapshoot

PORTLAND, June 24 (AP)—Frank M. Troeh, ace Portland gun club trapshooter, won the combined 1946 Oregon state-Pacific International trapshooting all-around championship yesterday. He shattered 381 of 400 claybirds to lead the handicap from 24 yards, at 21 yards, the doubles and place high in the 16-yard firing.
