

Freedom For Life Termers Ended In Shooting Chase

PORTLAND, June 24 (AP)—A shooting chase from the YMCA lobby through crowded Saturday night downtown streets brought capture of Byron Neal Dyson, 21-year-old Oregon life termer.

Dyson's capture by two Portland detectives and Prison Guard Captain W. L. Babson returned to the state penitentiary at Salem the last of five youthful prisoners who broke out April 2.

City Detective W. L. Brian reported Dyson surrendered to Detective Bob Chester after a four block chase. The detective started shooting through auto windows and windshields as the escapee tried to elude pursuit behind parked cars on a darkened parkway section.

Dyson, wearing the uniform of a merchant seaman, his red hair dyed black and hand tattoo marks arched, apparently believed he could return to Oregon and not be recognized. It was the second time he had been recaptured after breaking out of the prison.

The detective reported Dyson told of spending most of his free time in New York City, but said getting jobs had been difficult because he had no social security number.

The tip that Dyson was registered at the YMCA came from Captain Babson. When the officers checked the "B" for the known alias—Robert Morgan—the convict was not in his room. The trio waited five hours. When Dyson walked into the lobby at 9:30 p. m., he recognized Captain Babson and dashed into the street.

Two hack saw blades were found in Dyson's shoes when he was frisked at the police station here.

Dyson broke out of the state penitentiary at Salem with four others the night of April 2 by forcing a window bar on the first floor of the south wing as the prisoners were returning from a picture showing.

Henry F. Brown, 18, Clackamas convict serving 11 years, was recaptured in Salem that same night. Others were picked up within a few days. They were Glen Wilson, 21; Wayne Leroy Long, 21; and Gordon Donald Jones, 15.

Dyson was returned to the state penitentiary Saturday night. Convicted on several charges, he was sentenced to life in jail on a charge of attempting to kill a fellow-convict.
