

Roosevelt Family Splits On Support Of Candidate In Seattle Primary Race

SEATTLE, June 26 (AP)—A divergence of political opinion between members of the late President Roosevelt's family today quickened the tempo of the already heated democratic congressional primary campaign in Seattle.

The rift was disclosed in a letter from Anna Roosevelt Boettiger to her brother, James Roosevelt.

Rep. Hugh De Lacy was endorsed by Roosevelt last week for renomination in the July 9 primary. Mrs. Boettiger, in her subsequent letter to "Jimmy," informed him she had known De Lacy and his opponent, Howard Costigan, while she was a Seattle resident and declared in effect her brother had picked the wrong man.

Mrs. Boettiger's letter, released by Costigan, said "This is written to you in the hope that it may be helpful to you in your ICC work."

(Roosevelt was slated to speak in behalf of De Lacy at a meeting sponsored by the Independent Citizens' committee of arts, sciences and professions here last Thursday but wrote that his health prevented his coming north.)

From her home in Phoenix, Ariz., Mrs. Boettiger wrote Jimmy:

"This is a line to let you know that John (her husband) and I believe that all Howard (Costigan) has written you about Hugh is true. We have known both men and their records ever since we went to Seattle in December, 1936.

"Howard was at that time one of the foremost members of the commonwealth federation and split with them solely over their 'party line' philosophies and action. When Howard resigned from the commonwealth federation he did so without fanfare. The result was that for a good many years thereafter he was still branded as a 'commie' by many in Seattle. Finally by patience and quiet work he managed to get across to the public that he was a liberal democrat.

"Our own personal knowledge of him is that he is definitely a liberal of the right kind."

Costigan split with De Lacy and the Washington commonwealth federation after the start of the war when he charged the organization policies followed too closely the interests of Russia.

Dragnet Out For Convicts

SALEM, Ore., June 26 (AP)—Search for three Oregon state convicts who escaped a prison farm gang under gunfire of guards was widening today.

The trio fled across an open field, dashed behind a barn as guards opened fire, and broke for the nearby woods to win their freedom late yesterday afternoon while working in a gang at the annex farm on the south edge of the penitentiary.

The office of Warden George Alexander listed the escapees as: La Verne F. Keller, 21, serving three years on a Jackson county conviction for contributing to delinquency of a minor; admitted to prison October 6, 1945.

Frederick E. Cleveland, 25, serving one year for larceny on Linn county conviction; received April 29, 1946.

Alfred W. Strain, 26, serving three year and one year sentences concurrently on Linn county conviction for possession of stolen property; received April 29, 1946.

Surplus Property Sales Increased

He said the property cost the government \$1,923,105.

VFW To Meet At Corvallis

Oregon's first postwar veterans convention, the 1946 Silver Jubilee and Victory Encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, will open at Corvallis the end of this month as delegates and visitors numbering nearly 10,000 partake of a shalalee and other Russian foods at majestic, snow-capped Mary's Peak.

Other highlights of the program will be Russian and Polish folk dances Sunday, July 1, and later in the day the memorial services in the Methodist church. Monday, business sessions will get under way and that evening a parade will be held. Also on Monday, there will be a banquet for the ladies auxiliary, and one for commanders and past commanders. A formal dance and banquet for all will be held the night of July 2. Election of officers and presentation of awards will feature the business meetings on the last day, July 3.

Leaving for the convention from Klamath are Department Inspector J. N. Brochtrop and District Commander J. J. McGilvary of district 13, including posts at Klamath Falls, Malin, Merrill, Chiloquin and Lakeview. Also going from Pelican post 1383, are Commander E. V. Zell, Doug Ambers, John Millins, Frank Sobczak and H. E. Roof. Since Pelican post 1383 is entitled to 40 delegates, more are expected to go, Zell said.

Mrs. J. J. McGilvary, Mrs. E. V. Zell, Mrs. Frank Sobczak and other members of the VFW ladies auxiliary are also planning to attend the convention.

State To Aid Road Building

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP)—A three-year road building program has been tentatively approved by the state highway commission to augment federal aid to the state and the federal forest road program.

The commission announced the three-year U. S. road expenditures in the state now total \$34,342,200 and the forest service program \$10,000,000.

Major projects planned are widening of the Oregon City-Canby section of the Pacific highway, \$413,000; a bridge over

the Willamette river at Independence, \$300,000; reurfacing of 12 miles of Wilson river highway, \$200,000; and improvement of Klamath Falls highway entrance, \$350,000.

Final approval on 73 projects and contract awards is set for tomorrow.

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock reported that the U. S. forest service should be notified that log hauling on state highways is causing unusually heavy wear on the roadbeds. He said the commission should urge that timberland sales not be made where existing roads are inadequate for the loads.
