The ceremony will be read tonight, Wednesday, in the Tulelake Community Presbyterian church.

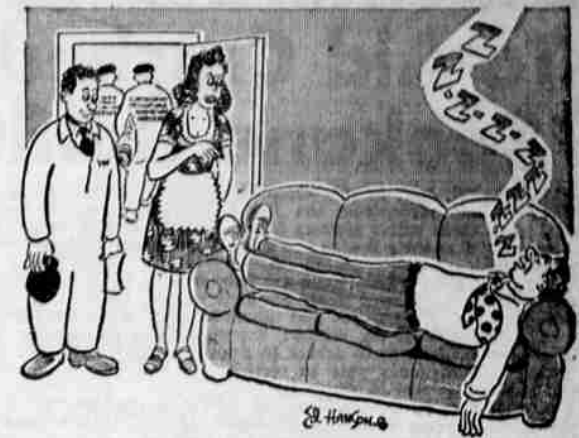
Miss Rhodes is a graduate of Tulelake high school, class of 1945, and later attended business school in Klamath Falls.
