

# Rainiers Vault Out Of Cellar

 Manager Jo Jo White personally slapped the pennant pretenders down with his baseball bat last night and bounced his Seattle Rainiers out of the cellar of the Pacific Coast league.

White's game-winning blow in the ninth inning defeated the Oakland A's, 6 to 5, but left them on top of the circuit.

Their position was undamaged in relation to the chief challengers, the San Francisco Seals, who also fell in a night for the underdogs before the booming San Diego Padres, 2 to 1. The Oaklanders hold a one-game advantage in the pennant chase.

White blasted a grounder for his second hit of the night, bringing in Beard for the winning rally. Charlie Gassaway, who relieved Ralph Buxton in the eighth, was charged with his fifth loss of the season.

**River Port Lumber Shipments Decline**  
 PORTLAND, June 26 (AP)—Shipment of 32,420,000 board feet of lumber from Columbia river ports in May represented a decline from the March-April average, the Pacific lumber inspection bureau reported today.

Two-thirds of the shipments went to domestic ports with exports going principally to France, China and Holland.

## Forrestal Promises Merger Cooperation

WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—Navy Secretary Forrestal has notified President Truman of his desire to cooperate "fully" to achieve the goals of the president's army-navy merger program.

Forrestal's attitude toward the merger proposal was expressed in a letter to Mr. Truman. The letter was released by the White House.

The navy chief said he considered the objectives recently outlined by the president as "attainable." He added that he believed it possible to overcome difficulties in drafting the necessary legislation.

"I wish to thank you for the patience with which you have listened to the navy's views on the reorganization of our national defense and for the time which you have devoted to the subject," Forrestal wrote.

"You may be assured of my desire and that of Admiral Nimitz to cooperate with you fully in the effort to achieve the objectives in your program."

# Softball Loop To Replay First-Half Postponements

With the end of the first half in sight, the men's softball league is beginning to catch up on its postponed games. Tonight the Merchants meet the Moose on Recreation field and the Knights of Columbus go to bat with Palmerton on Legion field. This was the game originally scheduled for June 19, but was cancelled because of the Louis-Conn fight.

Friday the games between Ashley's and the Moose and the Merchants and VFW which were rained out June 21 will be played. The Merchants and VFW will be at the Legion field, Ashley's and Moose will play on Recreation field.

The tie game, ending at 11-all, between the Elks and the Moose June 10, will be replayed July 1 on Recreation field. This will be the last game of the first half, and the winner of the half will be figured on a percentage basis.

The softball second half will proceed exactly like the first half, starting July 2, according to Harold Hendrickson, manager of the softball league. The two teams expected to join decided until next year because of the late season, lack of players and lack of uniforms, Hendrickson said.

In case of duplication, a third or fourth team will then be chosen to fill in the vacant place. PORTLAND, June 26 (AP)—The OPA today reported the Four Corners garage, Salem, had paid \$400 to the federal treasury for overcharges on mechanical services.

At the same time it announced filing a \$111,114 treble damage suit in federal court against the Spencer Packing company, Lebanon, charging the firm collected \$37,038 in excessive charges of 8 to 9 cents a pound on frozen berries from July 1, 1945 to the present. OPA Attorney Sylvanus Smith said most of the fruit was sold to a Portland wholesaler.

SALEM, June 26 (AP)—Sponsors of the six initiative petitions now being circulated have only another week to get the petitions completed with 24,000 signatures, with the prospect that only one or two of them will get on the November general election ballot.
