Watters, Ed Ostendorf and Hall, decided to form a new corporation using the name of Consumers Heating company with a capital stock of \$200,000 or 4000 shares with a par value of \$50 per share.

Hall said today that of the \$100,000 needed to handle the deal, only \$27,000 had been subscribed.

**Sunday Deadline**  
"The deadline is Sunday, June 30. We're trying to meet this deadline and if we don't, there won't be any heat."

"Fortunately or unfortunately most of the business houses in town are built around heating service and most of the houses have neither furnaces nor chimneys to which they could connect a heating plant of their own," Hall stated.

Recently the Consumers Heating company has been busy accumulating all fuel possible and this is being done by the Klamath Heating company at the request of the committee. Plans call for a stock pile of fuel for winter use so that it will not be necessary to convert to oil in case of a shutdown of mills during cold months.

**Program Continued**  
Despite the fact subscriptions were not coming in satisfactorily, the committee is going ahead with plans. G. C. Lorenz, a member of the committee and original owner of the plant, advised the chamber of commerce directors Wednesday that the Consumers have their eye on one of the boilers at the Marine Barracks heating plant and want to buy it. The Barracks has five boilers and the one sought by the company is the newest and has never been used except for test.

Hall said that his company hoped to obtain this boiler for it didn't it would be a long time before another could be obtained. Present plans of the new company call for rebuilding of the boiler that is now down, and repair of the one in use, as well as repairs on 7th street and points where steam escapes. This will use up the \$100,000 which the company hopes to have subscribed.

**Court Sentences Terrorist Band**  
JERUSALEM, June 27 (AP)—A military court today sentenced 30 members of the militant Jewish underground organization Irgun Zvai Leumi to 15 years imprisonment for carrying firearms and explosives.

Another member of the organization, Benjamin Kaplan, was sentenced to prison for life for shooting at a British soldier. After the sentences were pronounced the 31 defendants stood at attention on the command of a leader and sang in loud voices the first stanza of Hatikvah, the Zionist national song. Relatives of the defendants who jammed the courtroom participated in the singing.

The sentences still are subject to confirmation by Gen. Sir Evelyn Barker, British commander-in-chief in Palestine.

# Trust Charged In Atom Metal

DENVER, June 27 (AP)—A federal grand jury today returned an indictment charging six corporations and five individuals with conspiring to fix prices and monopolize the vanadium industry, which produced uranium raw material for atomic bombs.

Named as defendants in the indictment which charges violation of the Sherman anti-trust law in two counts were: Union Carbide and Carbon corporation, New York; United States Vanadium corporation; Electro Metallurgical company, and the Electro Sales corporation and the Electro Metallurgical company of Canada, Ltd., all wholly owned subsidiaries of Union Carbide and Carbon corporation, and the Vanadium corporation of America, New York.

Individuals indicted were: J. R. Vanfleet of New York, president of United States Vanadium corporation; Blair Burwell, New York, vice president of United States Vanadium corporation; W. G. Haldane, New York, vice president of United States Vanadium corporation; E. D. Bransome, New York, president of Vanadium Corporation of America; F. F. Kett, New York, general manager of the mining division of Vanadium Corporation of America.

The indictment charges that the two principal defendants, Union Carbide and Carbon corporation and Vanadium Corporation of America, control about 55 per cent of all of the commercially available vanadium-bearing ore deposits. Between them they control 99 per cent of all the vanadium oxide produced, sold and consumed in the United States and 100 per cent of all the ferrovanadium produced and sold in the United States.

**Evatt To Seek Veto Showdown**  
NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—Dr. Herbert V. Evatt, Australian foreign minister and delegate to the United Nations security council, was reported authoritatively today to have decided to demand a showdown on the veto question in the coming session of the general assembly.

Sources close to Evatt said the Australian had made that decision after last night's confused and acrimonious debate over the Spanish question in which Soviet Russia invoked the veto three times.

Evatt has been against the veto from the start of the United Nations. His latest move indicates he will fight for removal of the veto from the charter of the United Nations.

lumber to the shipper himself at dummy addresses, to be held for bargaining.

2. Re-sawing of lumber without regrading.

3. Refusing to produce standard size lumber, such as 2x4's and turning out exclusively 2x4 1's, which must then be remilled at the cost of the building contractor.

4. Up grading of materials.

5. Charging customers for more lumber than was actually received.

6. Marking retail sales without having licenses.

7. Flagrant over-celling sales.

8. Cutting short lengths.

The OPA said it started the actions under urging by U. S. Attorney General Tom Clark and with funds appropriated by congress three months ago. Within the last few months the OPA has employed numerous investigators in a probe of the western lumber industry.

ing milling in transit and custom milling involving 250,000 board feet. The suit alleges the firm added to invoices charges for custom milling not performed.

Crown Lumber company, Culp Creek, Ore., operated by J. H. Tyson and E. B. Kindred, Oakland, Calif., charged with selling standard dimension lumber at premium prices restricted specifically to lumber produced for railroad car bracing by agriculture producers.

The district OPA office explained the fractional size practice complained of, gives the seller a price for approximately one-third more lumber than the purchaser receives.

Samuel E. Sax, district OPA attorney, said today damages sought, including cases in which damage claims have not yet been specified, would total about \$750,000.

PORTLAND, June 27 (AP)—A million-dollar plan for easing traffic congestion in Eugene was presented today to the state highway commission by a Eugene delegation.

The plan, a joint city-county proposal, calls for filling in the mill race in front of the campus, constructing a cloverleaf intersection and constructing a bridge across the river. It would be financed by \$500,000 contributions from each the city and the county and \$135,000 from the highway commission.

Commission engineers are to draft a contract agreement for the commission's approval.
