

U. S. Awards Contracts For Big Irrigation Job

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Contracts for construction of the largest irrigation canal ever built in the Pacific northwest, to furnish water for the Columbia basin project in Washington, have been awarded by the interior department.

The department announced today that a tunnel through solid rock, nearly two miles long and 23 feet in diameter; a siphon, and 1000 feet of the main canal of the project, will be constructed by T. E. Conolly, Inc., San Francisco. The firm was awarded the job on a bid of \$3,494,420. A second contract awarded to J. A. Tertel and Sons, Inc., of Boise, Idaho, calls for construction of 5.4 miles of the main canal for \$1,548,000.

The tunnel and canals will carry water stored by Grand Coulee dam to the 1,200,000 acre irrigation project of which the reclamation bureau hopes to have 7,000 acres irrigated by 1947.

The tunnel and canals will carry water from an equalizing reservoir created by constructing dams at both ends of a 27-mile gorge of the old Columbia river channel. The water will be pumped from Lake Roosevelt, formed by Grand Coulee dam. The main canal will extend to another reservoir to be

created by Long lake where a canal now under construction will carry it to the land to be irrigated.

The reclamation bureau estimated that 2000 men will be employed in construction work at the project this summer.

Grave Marker Honors Friend Of Matsuoka

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27 (AP)—A grave headstone dedicated in 1933 by former Japanese Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka to the American woman who once sheltered him is a reminder here of the years Matsuoka lived as a Portlander.

Matsuoka came to Portland as a 13-year-old Japanese "mission boy" in 1893 and soon was taken into the home of Mrs. Isabelle Dunbar Beveridge, now deceased, while he attended grammar school.

The very little Yosuke, wearing Oriental short trousers and a winning smile, earned part of his keep delivering coffee to city restaurants while he learned his ABC's. He completed high school at Oakland, Calif., but returned to Portland to enroll in the University of Oregon law school here and at the Eugene campus, graduating in 1900.

Classmates recall his passion for stud poker and his excellent law school honors. When he entered Japanese diplomatic service in 1904 his rapid rise was watched closely—and with pride—by Portland friends.

When he returned to Portland in 1933, his last visit, he already was world famous. That same year he walked out of the League of Nations chambers at Geneva, taking with him the membership of the Japanese nation in protest to the league's action in the Sino-Japanese incidents then troubling Asia.

The red granite grave headstone he purchased and dedicated April 10, 1933, to Mrs. Beveridge bears the text: "Raised by the loving hands of Yosuke Matsuoka in token of the lasting gratitude for the sympathy and gentle kindness of a woman, who, next to his mother, shaped his mind and character."

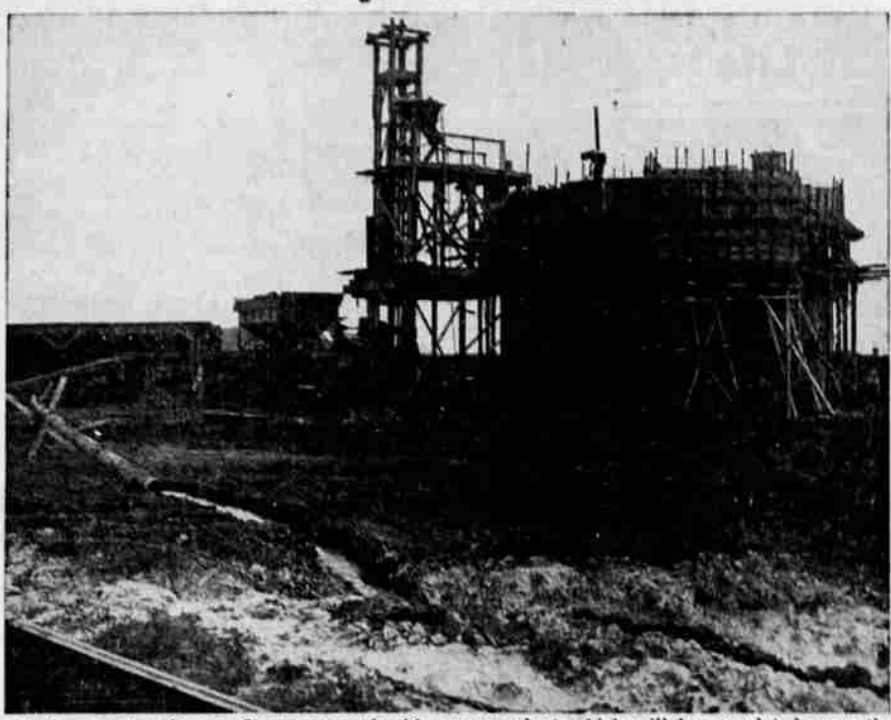

Sewage Treatment Plant



Under construction on Owens street is this sewage plant which will be completed some time this summer. The plant will work with the city's present disposal plant in the purifying of waste material.

Sewage Plant Work Delayed

Work on the city's off-site sewage treatment plant under construction on Owens street is being delayed by a shortage of material, according to C. A. Dunn, contractor for the project. Although no opening date can be set for the plant, Dunn indicated that the work should be finished some time this summer.

Parts needed in the building are from three to six months behind the date set for delivery. The pouring of concrete will be completed this week, but the

sewer outlet has not been finished. It requires a special type of pipe which is manufactured in the east, and so far the workers have been able to get only half of the amount needed. Pumps are expected to be completed by July 15.

The new disposal plant is being set up to relieve the load of the present sewage plant, which is working to full capacity. Waste material from the Mills addition area will be

diverted to the new building for treatment. After this the purified material will go to the west side of the Klamath river for disposal. Construction of the \$85,000

plant was begun March 1 under the federal public housing act. The city is paying 10 per cent of the cost and will maintain the plant after it is completed.
