Soroptimists Hold Final Meeting

Soroptimists at their last program meeting of the year, listened to a talk on suburban planning by Frank Howard, county surveyor and engineer. Howard is one of the state committee appointed by the governor to make a survey of the suburban problem and work out some way to remedy it.

Howard said that with the coming of the automobile era many people have migrated from cities to suburban areas and made their homes, so that they could have more freedom in the matter of playgrounds for children and gardens and could cut down the expense of living.

The advent of light, low-priced cars made it possible for them to go to and from their work in a minimum of time, and a great many city workers have joined the throng of suburbanites.

This has raised a serious problem, particularly in our own suburban areas, that of drainage, sewage disposal, roads, fire protection, and our present laws are inadequate to control these matters.

Howard said that Wisconsin and Michigan have very satisfactory legislation to govern these matters and California has some laws affecting suburban planning that are very good.

In this state the county commissioners are hampered in these things because they cannot do anything about it until ordered by the state legislature.
