

Three Flags Road Effort Gets Praise

LAKEVIEW, July 1—Highly regarded recognition for long and consistent efforts of the Three Flags Highway association and many chambers of commerce, county, city and state groups came during the past week from both federal and California state highway officials.

Almost coincidental with statements by heads of the California highway commission, made while visiting Alturas, Calif., on a recent tour of northern state highways, to the effect that reconstruction work on the section between the Oregon state line and Alturas would begin very shortly, came a paralleling pledge of support from Thomas H. MacDonald, head of the federal public roads administration.

While attending a recent convention in Cincinnati, O., County Judge Nelson B. Higgs, of Burns, along with Forrest E. Cooper, Lakeview, treasurer of the Three Flags Highway association, questioned MacDonald on his plans for this stretch of road badly in need of rebuilding.

MacDonald's reply, Higgs and Cooper state, promised complete support of Washington in California's plans for reconstructing the Three Flags highway (U. S. 395) to modern standards.

According to Jack Mayne, executive manager of the Three Flags group, MacDonald's ready recognition of road in question and his unhesitating pledging support of the public roads administration in this work is accepted by officials of the highway association as evidence that these badly needed improvements soon will be effected.

Negress Found Dead At Weed

YREKA, July 1—Mrs. Stella Coleman, 48-year-old negress, Thursday noon was found dead in bed at her Weed home from a .38-calibre bullet wound through the heart. The shot apparently had been self-inflicted. Lydia Coleman, a sister-in-law of Mrs. Coleman, with whom the latter had been making her home, discovered the body at 11:45 a. m. Thursday. The bullet is believed to have been fired about 15 minutes earlier.

A preliminary investigation, conducted Thursday by Deputy Coroner Muriel Upton of Weed, revealed that Mrs. Coleman had been dependent since the death of her husband, Douglas Coleman, about two years ago.

She had also been in poor health for some time suffering from injuries sustained about five years ago when she was shot seven times in the abdomen by a berserk negro at Weed. For the past few days Mrs. Coleman had been bedridden and under a doctor's care.

The negress is survived by her mother who lives in Louisiana and two nieces. Funeral services were held Sunday from the Mount Shasta Baptist church in Weed.

An inquest, held Friday afternoon in Weed by Coroner Alois Turner of Yreka, resulted in a verdict by the coroner's jury of death by suicide.

Victim Of Crash Dies In Portland Hospital

PORTLAND, July 1 (AP)—Lawrence R. Kirkland, 31, Camas, Wash., injured May 12th in a two-car collision, died at a hospital here last night, bringing Portland's 1946 traffic toll to 24.

Gilbert E. Stevens, 23, Portland, whose car collided with Kirkland's was killed outright. Myrtle Krogh, 23, Camas, was slightly injured.

Tulelake Man Asks Divorce

YREKA, July 1—Charging cruel and inhuman treatment, E. A. Davis, co-publisher of the Tulelake Reporter, filed suit for divorce from Frances H. Davis in superior court here June 27.

The couple was married on October 15, 1929, in Klamath county, and separated September 15, 1944, according to the complaint.

Davis asks that fair and proper orders be made regarding custody of the couple's two minor children and the disposition of the community property.

Mrs. Davis several months ago filed suit for separate maintenance against her husband.
