This ship is the first plane of this size to be seen in Klamath Falls, and marks one of the greatest forward strides in aviation in design and utility as a personal plane. Seating four people side by side in front and rear seats like a car, the plane carries a useful load of 944 pounds and will operate within the same space used by much smaller ships. The interior of the cabin is 80 per cent sound proofed and is fitted with a dome speaker for the radio, which will replace the old headpieces formerly used in plane radios.

U. N. Committee Chosen For Atom Control Work

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—Dr. Herbert A. Evatt, chairman of the United Nations atomic energy commission, today named the United States, Russia, Great Britain, France, Mexico and Australia to a special sub-committee to lay the groundwork for a plan to control the bomb.

The first five nations were named as "permanent" members of the sub-committee while Australia was seated as the country holding the chairmanship of the commission.

The entire atomic energy commission agreed last Friday that the smaller group should analyze the views already presented to the commission. The commission itself will meet again in plenary, open session Wednesday at 11 a. m. PST.

The "sub-committee No. 1" will have before it a chart prepared by Bernard M. Baruch, United States member of the commission, showing the expressed views of all 12 members. This chart demonstrated that the United States and Russia, proponents of the two principal plans before the commission, were in conflict on three points including the veto and were agreed on three phases. The Russian and United States plans left

14 other points open to negotiation, according to the chart.

The United Nations security council remained in recess, awaiting the call of the chairman. There was considerable speculation that the council might not meet until some time next week.

There was little activity in the United Nations headquarters over the week-end. Two delegates, however, did express themselves on the veto question and the work of the council.

Merschel V. Johnson of the United States, and Dr. Quo Tai-chi, of China, in a broadcast Saturday night on the University of the Air (NBC) deplored irresponsible use of the veto power in the United Nations.

Dr. Quo said the veto weapon might eventually be abandoned. Johnson disagreed with Quo on his prediction that the veto would be killed. Johnson said the veto power "was accepted by the United Nations at San Francisco with the clear understanding that it would be used only sparingly. It should certainly not be used lightly or irresponsibly to prevent peaceful settlement of disputes that have been agreed to by the majority," he said.

Meanwhile, a United States delegation spokesman said this country would support Siam in its application for membership in the United Nations. Siam, Albania, and Outer Mongolia are the only nations thus far to file applications for membership.

Fire District Plan Underway

Enthusiasm ran high at a meeting last night of the Suburban League and the Shasta View grange in their cooperative planning for the formation of a fire district in the south and east suburban areas of Klamath Falls.

The procedure of getting an okay on the proposed district was explained and will get underway by circulating petitions which must have the signatures of at least 25 per cent of the property owners when the final petition is presented to the county court. Petitions will be circulated immediately.

Upon receipt of the petition the court will call a public hearing, and later an election to determine whether the fire district will be formed.

If the results prove favorable a board of directors will be elected. The board will consist of five members, with one retiring each year.

Keith Ambrose, Klamath Falls fire chief, and M. J. Gilson, deputy state fire marshal, spoke on organizing the district and technical details to be considered. Ambrose offered his assistance in laying out boundaries for the district.

The group estimated that the district will be organized in approximately two months after the petition reaches the county court.

The Henley area is also considering the formation of a fire district.

Oregon VFW Starts Annual Convention

CORVALLIS, July 1 (AP)—The Oregon department of Veterans of Foreign Wars and its auxiliary opened business sessions today after yesterday's barbecue attended by 3,000.

The barbecue on Mary's Peak opened the 25th jubilee and victory encampment of the organization. Governor Snell, Portland's Mayor Earl Riley, State Senator Dean Walker, Independence, and VFW officials spoke briefly.

A joint memorial service was held here last night, with the Rev. Daniel Stevens, former chief of chaplains for the Ninth Service command, as speaker.

Alfalfa Seed DDT Dusted

LAKEVIEW, July 1—Alfalfa for seed in the Westside district was dusted with DDT last week for control of thrips and lygus bugs. These insects have been found to seriously damage the seed set in other areas, according to Elgin M. Cornett, county agent.

Oregon State college entomologists dusted with a power machine on the Roy Peterson, Ira Bolton, and Pierson Bros. farms, Byron Caldwell, Klamath Falls pilot, applied DDT dust from his airplane on the Fred Nelson, C. Buck, and J. Bernard farms.

The dusted fields were found to have practically no bugs on the following day. DDT does not seem to seriously effect bees since they leave the field for a day or two or until the weather weakens the effect of the chemical. The heavy rain last week washed some of the dust off the alfalfa and results obtained will be irregular since it was impossible to repeat the application.
