

# Cardinals Drop Pair To Pirates

Four games ahead prior to yesterday, the Brooklyn Dodgers gained a game and a half on St. Louis by whipping the Boston Braves for the fourth straight time 4-1, while the cellar-dwelling Pittsburgh Pirates were dealing the Cards a double defeat, 4-3 and 1-0.

The Dodgers sewed up the game early, jumping on big Mort Cooper for four consecutive hits, good for three runs, in the first frame. They added another in the fourth, while Rex Barney, pitching his first complete game for Brooklyn, was vulnerable only in the seventh when Billy Southworth's fifth placers scored their only run.

The Cards lost a couple of heartbreakers, dropping the first game to Fritz Ostermueller, 39-year-old veteran southpaw who scattered 11 safeties for his seventh victory. Ralph Kiner's 10th homer with one on in the fourth proved the deciding blow. The Bucs won the nightcap in the last of the ninth when Catcher Bill Baker singled in the only run of the game with two away to enable Nick Strincevich to register his second straight shutout triumph.

Klamath Scores 30 Runs In Bombing Visitors At Recreation Diamond

What happened to the Redding Cubs on Recreation field yesterday afternoon shouldn't happen to any ball team anywhere.

The visiting Californians, after burning up one car and blowing out two first gettings here for their appointment, were atom-bombed by the Klamath Sons 17-3 and 13-5, in two seven inning debacles.

Around the Northern California league, the loop-leaders, Weed, won their eighth straight game by clouting Mt. Shasta 9-3, and Dunsmuir overpowered McCloud 17-11.

In the first game of yesterday's twin slaughter, the Sons touched Earl Hacker for four runs on four hits in the initial inning, then scored in every frame out the third in amassing their 17 total. Jim Olsen, nicked for 10 hits, fanned 12 of the Cubs in seven stanzas.

Repeat In Nightcap  
The afterpiece was a repetition of the first-game carnage, although the Sons were held hitless, three up and three down in the first inning. Nine runs off nine hits and a couple of Redding errors came across in the second inning, and two more were marked up in the third and fifth.

Clyde Carlstrom, hurling the second tilt, fanned 10 but was touched for four runs and five hits in the fourth inning, and another run in the sixth.

It was a field day for Klamath batsmen. Hi Hatfield slapped out seven hits in nine trips to the plate, including a double and a triple; Ernie Bishop had six for seven; Bart Golbar and Johnny Pastega three for four; Mario Piston three for five.

Only One Loss  
The league's other clubs—Hollywood and Sacramento—split Sunday but the Stars kept their near-clean sweep paraded with six wins and only one loss for the week.

Big Les Searsella of Oakland had a great day Sunday. He hit five for seven, batting in four runs, and collecting his 21st homer, which won the nightcap in the sixth, 4-1. Don Pulford, starting for his first time on the Seattle mound had hurled shut-out ball up to that point.

In his own half of the fifth Pulford had blasted out a triple, scoring Bill Beard who had singled to get on. The Oaks won the opener 5-3.

At San Diego, Seals Pitcher Frank Rossi drove in the winning run of the opener in the seventh and went to second on Joe Sprinz sacrifice bunt. He scored from there for the 2-1 edge.

The seven inning nightcap was a 9-2 walkaway for the Seals.

At Los Angeles the Angels won with what was almost a double shutout, 6-1 and 6-0. Don Osborn hurled his fourth victory in a row in the opener.

Sacramento shut out the Hollywood Stars in the Sunday opener 4-0. Tony Freitas doing the honors for his eleventh win of the season. In the curtailed nightcap, the Stars won 6-2.

SPOKANE, July 1 (AP)—The Spokane Indians, new manager, Ben Geraughty, watched from a dugout yesterday as eight players went through first reorganization drills that will put the team back into Western International league baseball.

Only two of the men working out started the season with Spokane. They were Pitchers Mill Cadinha and Joe Faria, who survived the bus crash last week in which nine players died. Cadinha and Faria escaped the tragedy by driving to the coast in a private car.

All organized baseball clipped in to keep the Spokane club in the eight-team circuit and Geraughty said more players were due to arrive today.

Among the newcomers who worked out yesterday were Bill Smith of Lake City, Iowa, an infielder; Charley Bates, a first baseman who hit 300 for Oakland last year in 35 games; Don Miles, a pitcher optioned by Portland; Fred Pollut, a semi-pro outfielder and pitcher from Seattle; Mel Steiner, a San Diego outfielder, and Jerry Varelman, a catcher who played with Lewiston, Idaho, in the Pioneer league before signing with Spokane.

Geraughty, his head still heavily bandaged and hobbling on crutches, succeeds Catcher Mel Cole, one of the nine victims, as team manager. Only other survivor of the wreck who watched the drills today, was Pitcher Pete Barisoff, also on crutches.

Four other players suffered serious injuries that will prevent further play this season. Club officials said they did not know when the Indians would be ready to play again.
