

County Budget Now In Effect

With only minor objections raised over the county court and budget commission's estimation of the county budget, the published list of expenditures by Klamath county for the next 365 days went into effect today.

Three objections were put in by department heads and adjustments made in those cases, but the total amount of the budget for 1946-47 is still \$635,945.82. Money for the adjustments was taken from the emergency fund.

In the original estimate the district attorney's office appropriation had been pared from \$2000 to \$500, and \$120 had been placed on the budget as a pay boost for J. Hawkins Napier, deputy prosecutor.

Clarence A. Humble, district attorney, asked that the investigation figure be restored to \$2000, and it was done by taking the \$120 raise tacked for the deputy and \$1380 from the emergency fund. Since the deputy district attorney is paid by the state, he was forbidden by law from taking the raise.

That boost puts the budget for the operation of the district attorney's office at \$7490 instead of \$6110.

For the welfare office under the item headed "care of poor not at poor farm," the amount for old age assistance had been cut from \$28,000 last year to \$23,000 for this year, but that \$3000 was restored. Also the budget for relief to dependent children had been reduced from \$9000 to \$6000, and that \$3000 restored. So the care for poor figure is now \$42,700 instead of \$36,750.

The last item adjusted was for books for the county library where an extra \$300 was added to the \$2350 budgeted, making \$2650 for books and the library total \$18,540.

Steamboat Veterans Open Annual Reunion

PORTLAND, July 1 (AP)—A thousand rivermen and friends thronged to the 21st annual reunion of veteran steamboat men of the west at Clampoog state park yesterday.

Some 160 made the trip up the Willamette aboard the stern-wheeler Claire—a trip cancelled during war years.

Capt. W. M. Bartlett, Salem, state planning engineer, outlined steamboating history before the group and predicted transportation of ore from eastern Oregon and Idaho to Portland and Salem via water.

OK Transfer Builds Plant

The new building will cost approximately \$30,000. The company plans to move into the office building over a close-down period July 4, 5 and 6.

Gold Miners Given Increase In Wages

GRASS VALLEY, Calif., July 1 (AP)—A general wage increase of 18 1/2 cents an hour became effective for gold miners today.

Basic wages had been \$6.25 for buckers and \$6.75 for miners for a 40-hour week, with time and a half for the additional 8-hour shift worked by the local mines on a 48-hour week. A two-year wage and working agreement was signed Saturday.
