

500 Deaths Estimated For Holiday Weekend

CHICAGO, July 2.—Five hundred persons will start out to celebrate the Fourth of July this year — and they won't come back.

The National Safety Council made that statement today in seeking to enlist every American in a united effort to prevent such a huge holiday accident toll.

The anticipated toll of 500

holiday deaths is not a prediction, the council said, but is an estimate based on average accident fatality totals for similar periods in previous years, taking into account this year's trend. The figure includes deaths from traffic, drowning, fireworks, falls, over-exposure to sun and all other accidents that annually mar the independence day celebration.

With travel virtually back to the 1941 level, despite the large number of war-scrapped cars, traffic deaths alone are averaging 45 per cent more than last year and running neck-and-neck with the all-time high of 1941.

This continuing upsurge in accidents will be aggravated by the four-day holiday celebration and a vacation season in full swing, the council believes. Recognizing the threat, more than 150 national organizations are joining with the council in a nationwide campaign behind the slogan, "Be Alive on the Fifth."

"So far this year traffic deaths alone have averaged 100 each day," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the council, "and that should be proof enough that the 500 estimate for the four-day holidays is not to be dismissed as the boy who cried wolf. Think before you take a chance—and be alive on the 5th."

Coos County Forbids Bivalve Consumption

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2 (AP) — Serving and sale of clams, mussels, and oysters were forbidden in Coos county today in the wake of a number of fatalities among farm animals.

Health officials said the animals had apparently eaten uncleaned clams—dangerous because the bivalve's stomach may contain the poisonous scuffle, plankton.

The state board of health here ordered samples to be taken from all Oregon beaches to determine whether plankton was present. Even if it is, thoroughly cleaned and fresh clams are safe.

Truck Driver Killed In Portland Smash

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2 (AP) — An oil truck driver was killed today in a collision with a passenger car in northeast Portland.

Austin E. Goodman, 46, Portland, driver of the truck, was pinned under the cab when it overturned and burst into flames. Its cargo tanks were empty.

The automobile's driver and two passengers were hospitalized.

Rents Lowered To Set Example

EAU CLAIRE, Wis., July 2 (AP) — Landlord Albert Alseth said the reason he lowered rents on his four apartments by \$2 a month and also reduced the rental on stores here and in Menomonie, Wis., was he wanted to set an example to other landlords.

He added that he hadn't reduced rents earlier because "I didn't want OPA to get the credit."

Permit Lack Doubles Cost

July 1 marked the beginning of a new, more strictly enforced permit and license policy by the city. From that date, people doing building work without the proper permit will pay a penalty of double the original cost of the license.

Walter Salsbery, recently appointed city building inspector, reported to city councilmen last night that he has been checking up on construction jobs being done without permits and has found a number of them. A permit must be obtained for construction work, re-roofing, remodeling, house moving, electrical work, plumbing work, curb and sidewalk cutting, and most kinds of businesses. For information on permits and licenses the office of the police judge, at telephone 3214, should be contacted.

DAR Draws Attention To Flag Display Rules

At all seasons of the year Americans are conscious of the national emblem and at this time particularly is it especially true. As one of the patriotic organizations, the Eulalona chapter of the Daughters of American Revolution advances the following rules which govern the displaying of the flag.

1. The flag should be displayed only from sunrise to sunset.
2. When carried in a procession with another flag or flags, it should be either on the marching right, or when there is a line of flags, it may be in front of the center of that line.
3. When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at an angle from a building, the union of the flag should go to the peak of the staff.
4. When the flag is displayed in a manner other than being flown from a staff, it should be displayed flat with the union upmost and to the flag's own right.
5. When it is displayed over the middle of the street the flag should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street or to the east in a north and south street.
6. When used on a speaker's platform, it should be above and behind the speaker. If flown from a staff it should be to the speaker's right.
7. Do not display the flag on a float in a parade except from a staff.
8. Do not permit disrespect to be shown to the flag.
9. Do not fasten the flag in such a manner that it can be easily torn.
10. Do not use the flag as drapery in any form whatever. Use bunting of blue, white, and red. Bunting should be arranged with the blue above, the white in the middle and the red below.

Indian Tribes Gather Again

PENDLETON, July 2 (AP) — Inland Empire Indian tribes, their ranks back to normal with returned war veterans, are pitching tepees today at the Umatilla reservation campground for an 11-day celebration of Independence Day.

Representatives of Lapwai, Warm Springs, Yakima and other northwest points will join Umatilla, Cayuse and Walla Walla tribesmen for what councilmen promise will be the largest of their annual ceremonial celebrations since before the war.

Scheduled events will include an opening parade and war dances on July 4 with all participants in tribal costumes. Traditional Indian games and contests will be staged daily with dances every night during the celebration.

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
 2. Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may enlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
 3. A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
 4. Up to 90 days' paid furlough, depending on length of service, with travel paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
 5. A thirty-day furlough each year with full pay.
 6. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to enlist or reenlist.
 7. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$185.63 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
 8. Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights for men who enlist on or before October 5, 1946.
 9. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater (of those still open) on 3-year enlistments.
