

Antelope Order Convention To Draw Large Attendance

LAKEVIEW, July 2 — With "I'll be there" and "Count me in" cards coming in by the scores the 11th annual convention of the Order of the Antelope, first post-war meeting of the clan, looks like the biggest thing in years. Founded in 1932 by Forrest E. Cooper, Lakeview attorney, the big western event has grown from a handful of men to 300 expected for this year's pow-wow. The convention will be held July 12, 13 and 14 at the Blue Sky hotel atop picturesque Hart mountain east of Lakeview, with Chief White Tail Marshall Cornett presiding.

Gib Fleet of Klamath Falls will be in charge of the barbecue, and all other cooking will be done by Phil Neas, Lakeview chef.
