Tomorrow, the Fourth of July, is going to be a holiday for almost everyone in the Klamath area, and the 5th, 6th and 7th will also be vacation days for a select few, so this story will be by way of a reminder of what's doing in the sports world for the people of leisure.

In the first place, there is a big rodeo in town, The Klamath rodeo this year is being billed as one of the biggest and wildest buckaroo and bulldogging shows in the country and comes off at the fairgrounds on S. 6th, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons. The big parade passes down Main street at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

For baseball fans, the Klamath Sons have scheduled a game for tomorrow afternoon and one

ary lakes you have to hike in but the fishing is good. Game commission biologists are now at Paulina and East lakes to see what's wrong with the fish there, not many biting.

Lloyd Timmons of Grants Pass has taken over the concessions at Rocky Point resort and has cabins and boats for rent. Lost river is open now and Klamath river closes Friday.

Tomorrow night is raffle night at the armory, and Mack Lillard is staging an elimination tourney to decide who is the most eligible young man on the mat circuit for a shot at the Pacific Coast junior heavy title now in the possession of Georges Dusette.

# Bosox Downed On Two Bingles

Spurgeon "Spud" Chandler, now in his 10th season with the New York Yankees and possessing one of the finest lifetime won and lost records among the American league's active pitchers, has almost always found the Boston Red Sox one of his most persistent hoodoos.

The 36-year-old righthander entered the present campaign with 80 victories in 110 games but enjoyed only a fair 11 and eight record against the Red Sox, including two Sox decisions this year.

Last night, however, before 68,617 spectators, largest night game crowd in baseball history, Chandler downed the pacesetters 2-1, on two hits for his 12th win of the season as against two defeats.

At that, Chandler caused the New York through some anxious moments as he issued nine walks.

But the veteran star bore down in the clutch and fanned nine and was nursing a no-hitter until Bobby Doerr singled with one out in the eighth inning.

The Yanks nicked Mickey Harris for a run in the second on Joe DiMaggio's single and Nick Eitner's double. The final marker came in the third when George Stinnes singled behind Phil Rizzuto's triple.

**Brooklyn Gains**

Brooklyn's Dodgers increased their National league margin over the St. Louis Cardinals to seven and one-half games by nosing out the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, while the Red Birds dropped a 7-5 airtight tilt to the Cincinnati Reds.

Cookie Lavagetto batted in the Brooks' winning run in the ninth inning when he singled home Relief Pitcher Art Herring to break a 2-2 deadlock. The win was the Dodgers' seventh straight and their tenth in a row over the Phils.

The Reds tallied seven unearned runs in the third inning to hand the slump-ridden Cards their fourth straight loss.

**Bruins Blanked**

Pittsburgh drew to within a game of the sixth place Phils as Ken Heintzelman blanked the Chicago Cubs, 9-0, and the Boston Braves sank the New York Giants deeper into the cellar by scoring a ninth inning 5-4 victory.

Cleveland moved over the St. Louis Browns into fifth place by rapping Tex Shirley of the Browns for 12 hits and a 4-2 win.

Chicago whipped the Detroit Tigers, 8-7, for their first victory of the year in the opening stanza with one on, the Pale Hose piled up a 7-2 advantage over Orval Grove.

The scheduled twin bill between the Washington Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics was postponed because of threatening weather.

# Injuries Bench Indian Manager

**SPOKANE, July 3 (AP)—**Ben Geraghty, newly appointed manager of the Spokane Indians baseball club, was "benched" yesterday on doctor's orders and will not handle the team when it reopens its Western International league play against the Yakima Stars in a doubleheader July 4, owner Sam Collins said today.

Collins said that under a "temporary" switch, Glenn Wright, former team manager, will handle the club until Geraghty has recovered.

Geraghty suffered a fractured knee cap and head injuries in a bus accident a week ago that claimed the lives of nine Spokane players.

**CLEVELAND, July 3 (AP)—**Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis isn't going to let a little thing like signing for a September title fight with Tami Mauriello stand between him and a try for the Forest City Golf association's amateur crown.

Joe, here for the Thursday-Friday-Saturday links affair, said he was supposed to be in New York one of those three days to sign for the September 18 Yankee stadium scrap, but that he wouldn't be there.

"Tami is a good game boy, and he takes a fine punch, and he's entitled to his chance," the heavyweight king said. "But I won't do any signing until after I talk with my old manager, John Roxborough, up in Jackson, Mich., next Monday. My new manager, Marshall Niles, has already gone up there to talk to him about it."

Joe, in two tours over the Highland course, registered scores of 79 and 81. The tourney is scheduled at the Seneca club.

"My putting is way off," he confided. And in explaining a bit of wildness with his woods and irons, he said: "My left thumb is bothering my golf a little. I hurt it in that fight with Billy Conn."

# PCL Players Form Union

**SAN FRANCISCO, July 3 (AP)—**The San Francisco Chronicle said today a baseball players' guild was being formed in the Pacific Coast league to bargain with the owners of the circuit's eight clubs.

Some officers of the organization were said to be members of the Hollywood and San Diego clubs but they were not named. Players interested in the guild were quoted as saying it would be independent and would not operate along the lines of the union which recently threatened to strike the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Informed of the movement, President Charles Graham of the San Francisco club, said he would be receptive to any guild requests, "if they are reasonable."

Requests reported under discussion by the group included:

1. Abolition of the recall on waivers, so that if a player is placed on the waiver list he must go to the club that claims him.
2. Cash percentages for players sold to major leagues if the sale price exceeds a certain figure—possibly \$30,000.
3. Elimination of Saturday night games.
4. Improvement of park facilities in some cities, with mention given San Diego and Portland.

**SPOKANE, July 3 (AP)—**Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler said today he had asked presidents of the major leagues to "give consideration" to an appeal for benefit games for families of nine Spokane ball players who lost their lives in a bus accident a week ago.

"Entirely in sympathy with the close relatives and survivors of the ball players who lost their lives in the recent bus accident, I am glad to commend any action that would be helpful to those survivors who may be in financial difficulties," Chandler said in a letter.

Weeks of steady pursuit from one rung on the ladder below the Oakland Aegons in the Pacific Coast Baseball league today paid the persistent San Francisco Seals a dividend of a share in the lead.

The lowly Portland Beavers snapped the six-game winning streak of the Aegons, 5 to 4, Tuesday night, with the aid of whatever pressure the relentless chase by the San Francisco Seals in the pennant race may have exerted.

San Francisco went on to its seventh straight victory, subduing the third-place Los Angeles Angels, 10 to 3, and evening the count with the Oakland outfit at 61 wins and 34 losses apiece. The San Diego Padres blasted the Hollywood Stars, 9 to 1, while Sacramento's Solons hammered out a 10-5 decision over the cellarite Seattle Indians.

With the count tied at 4-4 by an Oakland ninth-inning rally, Danny Escobar neatly singled with the bases loaded and two out to spell the downfall of the Aegons. Portland opened up on Rugger Arizola for three tallies in the second frame, added one off Relief Pitcher Tom Hafey in the seventh and nicked Bro Palica for the winner in the finale. Les Scarsella touched off the Oakland rally with a base-loaded single.

Guy Fletcher went the distance although he yielded the Rainiers 13 hits, while his Sacramento mates collected 16 safeties off three Seattle chuckers. Outfielder Bill Ramsey, traded by Seattle to Sacramento to get Jo Jo White to manage the Rainiers, plauged his old teammates with three hits worth as many runs.
