

Major League Season Passes Halfway Mark

The major leagues wade into the second half of the first postwar baseball campaign today virtually assured of establishing a new season attendance record before the end of this month. They have hopes of reaching the 20,000,000 mark before the season comes to a close September 29.

A total of 23,456 fans paid to see yesterday's Independence Day bargain bills to boost the total attendance for the National and American leagues to 8,909,352, only two million short of last year's record figure.

Neither the Yanks nor the Cards were able to take advantage of the mediocre performance of the league leaders yesterday. With a chance to gain a full game each, the challengers played follow the leader and split their twin bills, as did the Red Sox and Dodgers. As a result, the Red Sox' six and a half game lead and the Dodgers' bulge of seven games remained intact.

Grid Device Gets Notice

"Football coaches can now measure in pounds the charging power of linemen with a practical dummy devised by Ed Ryan, coach at Klamath Falls, Ore., reads off an article in the July issue of Popular Mechanics' magazine.

Ryan's contraption has been given wide publicity in newspapers in Oregon and he believes that the article had been received by the magazine through affiliated newspaper sources.

The device is a sort of blocking dummy which registers the force of impact on a dial, and Ryan originally invented, built and tested it as a basis for a thesis for his master's degree at the University of Oregon.

The testing mechanism was built for him at the Eugene vocational school, and is now being used by the university for research in its physical education department.

This blocking dummy is constructed to fasten on a telephone pole or any other steady pole handy. It's made of airplane aluminum, mostly, and weighs 50-60 pounds. The part the football linemen's shoulder hits is lightly padded with felt, because a heavy padding would absorb much of the shock of impact and defeat the purpose of the pounds-register.

According to Coach Ryan some minor bugs have to be worked out before the machine can be used extensively, but it has been geared down to record actual pounds force of impact.

Although he has tested it only with high school players, some have jarred the indicator up to 1200 pounds, and Ryan himself has gotten it up to 1600 pounds and says that he almost broke his neck doing it.

The equipment is used only to record the power produced on a one-step block, just as a lineman throws against an opposing lineman in a football game. Ryan says that he has found that just pure leg strength is not what makes a lineman, but a fast, powerful blow is what adds up. The face of the indicator will register up to 3000 pounds, if anyone can get it up that high. The springs which the block must mesh come from the front end of a 1934 kno-knock Plymouth and are plenty strong.

EUGENE, July 5 (AP)—The University of Oregon football squad will get its long-awaited return game against the University of Texas in Portland, September 27, 1947.

The game, a return engagement which was delayed because of the war, will open the season for the Webfoots and will be played at Multnomah stadium.

First tilt in the two-game series was played at Austin, Texas, in December of 1941 when Coach Dana X. Bible's Texans walloped the Oregonians 71-7. The defeat was soon forgotten by the sporting public because of Pearl Harbor, but the Webfoots did not forget and have been hoping for "revenge."

The Sacramento Solons alone of the Pacific Coast league's eight baseball clubs had something to celebrate today from the Fourth of July doubleheader.

While the rest split twin bills, the Solons came up with clutch hitters for a double dousing of the Seattle Rainiers, 5 to 4 and 5 to 3, with Leftfielder Joe Marty supplying the telling blow in each game.

In the first engagement Marty singled through the infield in the ninth inning, driving in two runs including the winner. His two-run single in the opening stanza of the second game put the Solons in front, and they were never headed. Gene Lillard, Sacramento pitcher turned outfielder, homered in the fifth for two more tallies, offsetting a seventh-inning Seattle rally.

Oakland's league-leading Oaks remained half a game ahead of the challenging San Francisco Seals as a result of the split bills.

The Oaks had to go nine innings in the nightcap, scheduled for seven, to win, 4 to 2, after losing the opener to the Portland Beavers, 5 to 3.

Oakland Pitcher Cotton Pippin opened the rally that won his own game. With one out in the ninth inning of the nightcap he doubled and scored on Brooks Holder's single. Holder advanced on Mickey Burnett's single and scampered home on Mar Marshall's long fly. Roy Resler won for the Beavers although he yielded the mound to Carl Fisher in the ninth.

Los Angeles blanked the Seals, 3 to 0, on Yank Terry's six-hit pitching, but San Francisco came back to win a pitching duel in the afterpiece, 3 to 1. Each team got three hits in the second game.

The Hollywood Stars opened with an 8-3 victory over the San Diego Padres, who retaliated for a seven-inning victory, 5 to 3.

Spotty fielding and unearned runs, plus the fast ball pitching of Buzz Sporer of the Roseburg Umpqua Chiefs, were just too much for the Klamath Sons yesterday afternoon on Recreation field and the locals dropped their Fourth of July tilt 5 to 2. The Chiefs earned only one of their tallies as Fran Miller limited them to five hits.

In the fourth inning, the game scoreless until then, Virgil Baker of Roseburg was safe on Larry Goerges' bobble of his grounder. Dick DeBarnardi sacrificed him to second, Lovell Baker hit to short and Virgil, caught in a rundown, outsmarted the entire Klamath infield in getting back to second safely.

Jerry Huggins walked, filling the bases, and Stan Long grounded to second on a squeeze play. Bart Golbar missed Roy Wheeler's throw and two runs came across.

Klamath scored once in the sixth when Earl Brooks tripled to the right field fence and tallied on Mario Pisan's single through the box. Then in the seventh the Sons drew up close again when Wheeler was safe at first on a wide throw of his roller to short, and raced all the way around on Golbar's double into deep left.

In the eighth inning DeBarnardi tripled to left center, and Spouter, pinch runner, scored when Goerges threw wild to Golbar on Huggins' grounder to short.

Again in the ninth Roseburg scored again when Jimmie West in right field misjudged Virgil Baker's long fly, letting it get by him. The throw-in was kicked around the infield while Baker raced all the way home.

Sporer was the fastest pitcher the Sons have faced this season and struck out 11 while giving up six hits. Miller fanned five. Heavy hitters of the day were Brooks and DeBarnardi with triples, DeBarnardi, George Saunders, Sporer and Golbar with doubles.
