

Roosevelts Still Wrangle Over Washington Primary

SEATTLE, July 5 (AP)—An otherwise drab Washington state primary election drew color today from the alignment of two members of the Roosevelt family in active support of opposing democratic candidates in the bitter congressional race.

The primaries will be held next Tuesday.

Campaign talks, by transcription, have come from Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Boettiger of Phoenix, Ariz., and from James Roosevelt, from Los Angeles.

For the "second round" of the Roosevelt vs. Roosevelt engagement, a transcription was received yesterday from Mrs. Boettiger for radio broadcast in Seattle today in behalf of Howard G. Costigan. A James Roosevelt transcription in support of Rep. Hugh De Lacy already is being used in the latter's campaign for re-election.

Mrs. Boettiger previously wrote to "Jimmy" that she thought, on the basis of her knowledge of both men from her former residence in Seattle, that he was picking the wrong man. The letter was released to Costigan for campaign use, but the new radio talk is her first flat, open endorsement.

Her radio talk does not refer personally to her brother, but in it she says she believes she and her husband, John Boettiger, Phoenix publisher, former Seattle Post-Intelligencer publisher and owner of a Seattle shopping publication, are more capable of judging the two Seattle men than "any members of a committee living in New York, Washington, D. C., and Los Angeles."

Mrs. Boettiger denounces De Lacy for policies allegedly paralyzing the communist "party line" and adds:

"We have heard H. De Lacy first give lip service to Franklin Roosevelt and the new deal, then we have heard him viciously attack Franklin Roosevelt as a 'warmonger' until Russia's involvement in the war.

James Roosevelt has recommended Congressman De Lacy as a follower of new deal principles. In response to a letter from Costigan, Roosevelt wrote curtly that he felt he was in a position best to know who were his father's friends and supporters.

Disabled Vets Have 6 Months

Disability retirement pay for physically disabled ex-navy and army officers should be applied for within six months after release from active service if it is not already being received, department of veterans' affairs officials said today.

Public law 101, 78th congress, provides retirement pay at 75 per cent of the base pay of the grade in which disability was incurred, and applies to all disabled army, navy, coast guard and marine officer personnel whether regular or wartime appointees, it was explained.

Another provision is that officers who were discharged without pay for physical disability have 15 years in which to request a review of their cases for the purpose of applying for retirement pay, according to the law.

Production Of Autos May Show July Jump

DETROIT, July 5 (AP)—Production of passenger automobiles and trucks in United States and Canadian plants this week was estimated by Ward's automotive reports today at 46,810 units against a revised total of 64,015 last week and 96,457 in the corresponding week of 1941.

Ward's said the outlook was for a marked upturn in July, adding however, that the passenger car makers may encounter some difficulty realizing their expected 225,100 assemblies this month due to labor and materials shortages.

Grants Pass Chosen For VFW Convention

CORVALLIS, July 5 (AP)—Oregon members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will hold their 1947 convention in Grants Pass, they decided here at the close of their 1946 session.

A Portlander, Earl C. Mead, was elected state commander. Mrs. Laura Bornuth, Grants Pass, was named a guard in the auxiliary.

Dates for next year's meeting were unset, but it will fall between June 15 and July 15.

Tacomans Lop 10-Day Beards

TACOMA, July 5 (AP)—Some Tacoma barbers were busy today lopping off the whiskers of those hardy souls who grew beards through the city's 10-day "jubilee celebration" which closed with a giant show in the stadium last night.

Bad weather and lack of interest dogged the "celebration" throughout. Little noticeable change was made in the normal routine except on three occasions—a parade on the opening day which filled the downtown streets, a street dance participated in by thousands of celebrants and the pyrotechnical display last night witnessed by about 20,000 persons.

Beard-growing, a special feature of the 10-day program, aroused considerable early interest but the inevitable itch, feminine displeasure and slow or scraggly growths caused many a whisker to drop by the wayside each day.

Today, those who held out got their shaves, and the city resumed its normal way except for some independence-loving souls who followed the lead of one grocery owner who posted a sign in his window reading: "This store will be closed July 4, 5, 6 and 7. Take it easy, like we're doing."

Funeral Scheduled For Bridge Builder

PORTLAND, July 5 (AP)—Funeral services were set today for Arthur A. Jones, 75, widely known bridge builder who died here Tuesday.

Although he had lived in Portland since 1885 he maintained his Odd Fellows lodge affiliation at Roseburg and recently went there to receive his 40-year pin. He lived at Roseburg as a boy.

Militia To Get 6-Year Course

A six-year plan for the training of approximately 571,195 men of the National Guard of the United States was announced recently by the army ground forces, headed by Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell. The plan, which provides for the progressive instruction of units in each state, is designed to standardize the training of the National Guard all over the country. During the first and second years individuals and units will be trained on a company level, during the third and fourth years on a combat command level; and the sixth year on a division level.

Specific types of training, such as basic and general, technical, and tactical, also will be undertaken. It is estimated that a minimum of 96 hours per year will be devoted to armory training and a minimum of 92 hours per year to field training.

Crowd Packs Baker Rodeo

BAKER, Ore., July 5 (AP)—Hundreds of people were turned away yesterday afternoon as an overflow crowd sat through five hours of thrill packed action at the city ball park to witness the Fourth of July which closed Baker's Oregon Trail Days celebration.

The crowd, estimated at 5000, saw some of the best horses and riders in the northwest competing for purses which totaled more than \$5000. Buck Abernethy of Baker, entering in the bronc busting, bulldogging, Brahma bull riding and milk and mug contests, won top prize money of \$500.

Two riders were injured slightly when thrown from bucking broncos.

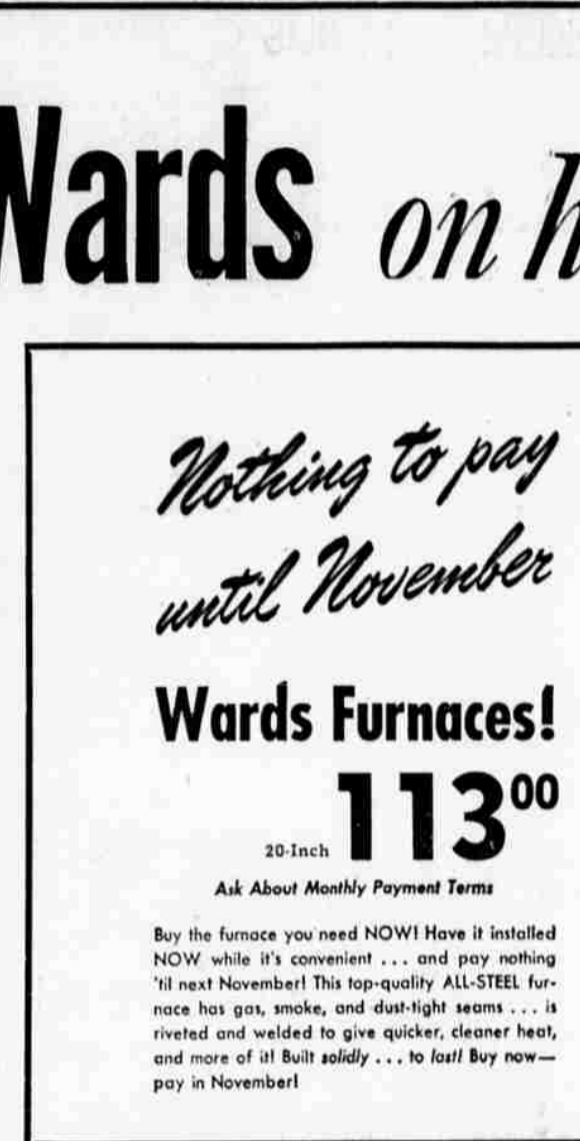

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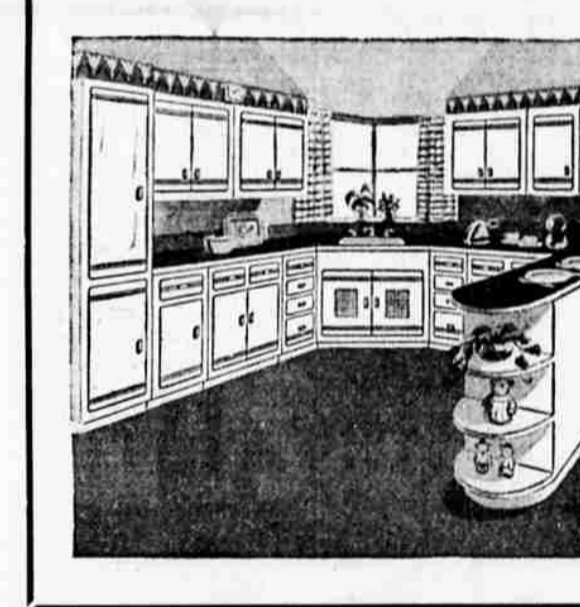
