Shuter Jailed For Shooting

Living up to his name, Richard Carl Shuter, 38, was arrested Wednesday for celebrating the Fourth prematurely and shooting up the town of Crescent. He is now in the county jail awaiting a hearing on a charge of assault, armed with a dangerous weapon.

Raymond W. Oehlerich, deputy sheriff at Crescent, arrested Shuter at Rosedale after he had allegedly drawn his pistol and attempted to shoot Fred G. Spencer of Rosedale, nearby community. Oehlerich said that Spencer had had trouble with Shuter before over theft of equipment from a restaurant, and Shuter was out on bail in that trouble.

Shuter fired off about 40 shots from a 22-cal. automatic pistol during the spree. Oehlerich said that he fired about two dozen shots in Crescent, incidentally shooting off the jail house chimney. Then he went to Rosedale and blasted away some more, and it was there he drew his gun on Spencer.

20-Day Limit On Army Reenlistment

However, trained specialists can still qualify for a grade appropriate to training and experience by reenlisting for three years within three months of the date of discharge.

Gun-Carrying Woman Jailed

Mrs. Levi Barney, the former Bernice Lober, 36-year-old Klamath Indian from Chiloquin, is being held in the city jail for carrying a concealed weapon after she is said to have threatened to kill her husband, Levi Barney, who is a patient in a local hospital.

The woman went to the hospital Wednesday night and asked a nurse if she could see her husband, and the nurse stalled her off by telling her to wait a minute while she looked to see if another man in the ward with Mrs. Barney's husband was in a presentable condition.

The nurse told Barney to lock his door, then called the police. When police arrived the nurse was keeping Mrs. Barney in conversation, and the weapon, a 38-cal. automatic, was sticking out of her dress top.

Police took the woman, handcuffed Mrs. Barney and took her to the jail. Officers said that they had been informed that the woman left Chiloquin with the express purpose of killing her husband.

'Lost' Masterpiece Returned To Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 5 (AP)—A painting believed to be the "Descent From the Cross," for alleged loss of which Mrs. Jean Bullitt Darlington of Westchester, Pa., sued Harvard university for \$100,000, has been returned to Harvard, the Boston Globe said today in a copyright-ed story.

The Globe said the painting, which Mrs. Darlington, a relative of William C. Bullitt, former ambassador to Russia, purchased in Antwerp, Belgium, in 1921 in belief it was a Rubens, was turned over to Harvard lawyers by a representative of a man who bought it for \$40.

The purchaser, the newspaper added, was not aware of its real value or that it had been the object of a six-year search.

British Find Jewish Cache

JERUSALEM, July 5 (AP)—The British army announced today that another large cache of munitions and "a large quantity of British battle dress" had been uncovered in the Jewish settlement of Mesheq Yagur.

British troops have been searching the settlement, which is located in the Haifa Bay area, since last Saturday, and previously had reported unearthing large quantities of contraband munitions in an elaborate underground storage depot.

The latest cache at Yagur was found in a bull's stall and contained portable radio transmitter and 667 German mortar bombs as well as rifle ammunition and explosives.

Tension continued high despite the release of three British officers by their Jewish kidnapers and a British announcement that many of the Jews arrested last weekend in a drive to curb armed violence were being freed.

The three British officers caged in wooden crates, were dumped unharmed from a truck in Tel Aviv last evening. They had been kidnaped June 18 by members of Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish underground resistance organization, and held as hostages to enforce Irgun demands for the commutation of death sentences imposed on two young Jews for shooting at British troops.

Roseburg Hospital Adds Young Doctors

PORTLAND, July 5 (AP)—Ten young physicians will be added to the staff of the Veterans' hospital at Roseburg, the veterans' administration reported here today.

They are in a group of 43 assigned to five northwest hospitals, and recently completed their internship under army specialized training and navy V-12 programs. They will report between July 10 and 20.

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
