

Contest Opens For Law Grads

E. H. Thompson, manager of the United States National Bank, and Mitchell Tillotson, manager of the First National Bank, announced today a statewide \$1,000,000 contest for 1946 graduates of Oregon law schools and all attorneys practicing in Oregon who were graduated from schools in or outside the state from 1940 through 1945.

Making the announcement for the Trust Companies' Association of Oregon, which both banks are members, Thompson said the contest would be open from July 1 to October 15, 1946.

First prize will be \$500. Second place will net \$400, third \$300, fourth \$200 and fifth \$100. All will be cash awards.

Deans of the three law schools in Oregon will name a committee of judges for the contest, according to Richard A. Welch, president of the association. The deans are Orlando John Hollis, University of Oregon, Eugene; Ray L. Smith, Willamette university, Salem, and James W. Crawford, Northwestern College of Law, Portland.

Two groups of law graduates are eligible for the contest. It was pointed out to Thompson by M. H. Erz, Portland, will drafting contest chairman for the association. One includes all 1946 graduates of University of Oregon, Willamette and Northwestern law schools regardless of whether they have been admitted to the Oregon state bar. The other includes all attorneys now practicing in the state who were graduated from 1940 to 1945, both inclusive, from schools either in Oregon or out of state.

Those planning to enter the contest must file an application, Thompson said, with Erz whose address is Trust Companies' Association of Oregon, 325 S. W. 4th ave., Portland 4.

tion to repair the property. It also have a building permit issued from the city to this effect," Mrs. McBeth said.

Both the Peck and Bridge families said they had always paid their rent promptly. The Pecks, who have a forty-year-old son, have occupied a three room cabin on the rear of the property and they have paid \$30 per month rent to Bridge who now pays \$45. During the life of OPA, Mrs. McBeth advised, the cabin was rented for \$40 and the Bridge house for \$35, giving Bridge his rent free with \$5 over. Under protest to the OPA, Mrs. McBeth said the five-room house was upped to \$45, and the cabin reduced to \$30.

Mrs. McBeth's agent today denied that he had told Mrs. McBeth to insert the \$9 and \$12 daily rental in her eviction order, but that was done by her attorney, Mrs. McBeth said. She said her dealings with the Pecks had been satisfactory, but last night, when she attempted to talk the matter over with Bridge, he refused to discuss it with her.

"This is a free America and I bought this property so I would like something to retire on," Mrs. McBeth said. "I don't expect them to pay that kind of rent but I want the house vacant so I can improve it."

It is understood that Mrs. McBeth originally paid \$4375 for the property. The three-room cabin occupied by the Peck family has no bathing facilities, the renters said.

Jury To Get Gartin Case

The all-male circuit court jury was slated to get for deliberation the trial of 26-year-old Harold Richard Gartin, indicted for rape involving a young Umatilla Indian girl, early this afternoon.

Gartin's short defense session ended this morning and his attorneys, U. S. Balentine and E. E. Driscoll had finished their closing arguments before the jury at noon.

Testifying for himself today, Gartin said that the girl had come from Chemawa, where she is a student at the Indian school, with him and Bob Faris early in April, but said that she told them she was going to California. He admitted he had given her money for a room, but denied that he had been intimate with her.

On April 21, Easter Sunday, the day the 13-year-old told the jury that he had visited her in her room at a Klamath avenue rooming house, Gartin said that he had spent the day in Chillicothe and was not in Klamath Falls at all. His wife, Virginia, also testified that he had been in Chillicothe that day.

The attractive girl, an eighth grade student at Chemawa and resident of Pendleton, said yesterday that Gartin had given her the money to rent the room, \$1 a day, and that he had visited her on several occasions.

Redin Denies Red Penalties

SEATTLE, July 9 (AP)—Lieut. Nicolai G. Redin, Russian naval officer on trial on espionage and conspiracy charges, denied today masters of Russian ships putting into Seattle during the war were forbidden to talk to American naval officers under threat of the death penalty.

"That's not true," he replied when asked by Chief Assistant U. S. Attorney Allan Pomeroy if Russian ship captains faced the extreme penalty if they talked with United States officers.

He said the death penalty would probably have been inflicted by the Japanese if they had captured Russian masters who had taken their ships into American waters.

Pomeroy, cross-examining the 30-year-old lieutenant, took Redin in step by step back over his testimony of yesterday in which he accused the federal bureau of investigation of personal indignities.
