

# Weed Tilt Hurts Sons' Bat Marks

The 10-hit Northern California league victory over Weed last Sunday put the Klamath Sons in a tie for first place in the standings, but did little to help the batting averages of the various players.

Ernie Bishop hit three for five, but still dropped 10 points in the hitting department, from 650 to 640, but he still figures as the most regular hitter on the club.

Bart Golbar got two for four and picked up eight points, go-

ing to 470 from 462. Hi Hatfield, the only other Son to get more than one single against the Weed pitcher, Jim Fruzza, collected two hits in four trips and raised from 441 to 436.

**Olsen's Mark Up**  
Jim Olsen's single drove in the winning run against the Californians and upped his average from .250 a week ago to .267, but Roy Wheeler went hitless in four attempts, sliding down to .286 from .353.

Hatfield, clean-up swinger in every game, now has collected 17 hits in 39 times at the plate, including three triples and a double. Bishop has hit safely 16 times in 25 times up, and his triple against Weed was his second of the season in league play. Hatfield has scored 11 times and Fran Miller has come across the plate for an even dozen runs.

**Only Loop Tilt**  
All these figures relate only to the nine Northern California league games played by the Sons.

Taking into consideration the pair of kings-X games with the Roseburg Umpqua Chiefs, Bishop got only one hit in five tries while the Sons were clubbing out 20 hits in the second Roseburg tilt, dropping his average to .367.

Golbar's mark would be .435, and Hatfield's .425. Jim Olsen's

# Joe, Tami To Fight

NEW YORK, July 10 (AP)—Joe Louis will make the 23rd defense of his world heavyweight title against Tami Mauriello of New York at Yankee stadium on Wednesday, September 18, Promoter Mike Jacobs announced today.

Jacobs said that both principals had signed contracts for the bout, which will be Louis' second title defense of the year. The champion knocked out Billy Conn at Yankee stadium June 18.

Ticket prices will be scaled from \$3 to \$30, taxes included, Jacobs said. Although terms of the contracts were not announced, it was learned that Louis will receive his customary 40 per cent of the receipts and Mauriello 15 per cent.

Mauriello, who is 23, has been fighting professionally since 1936. Five years ago he twice attempted unsuccessfully to win the light heavyweight title from Gus Lesnevich.

He has had 77 bouts, winning 69. His record shows 51 knockouts; he has lost seven decisions and has fought one draw. During the past 18 months he has run up a string of 12 straight victories, 11 by knockouts. His last bout was at Madison Square Garden, May 17, when he knocked out Bruce Woodcock, British empire heavyweight champion, in five rounds.

**Good Aim Saves Engineer's Life**

MALDEN, Mass., July 10 (AP)—Trapped in conveyor belt rollers which were crushing his legs, a 46-year-old engineer saved himself today by throwing tin cans until he hit an electric switch which shut off the power.

George Ross of Saugus aimed for his life 30 times before he scored the hit which stopped the rollers.

Dragged into the machine above the knees, at the Potter Drug and Chemical company, Ross twisted a jackknife out of his pocket and cut through a heavy four-foot belt.

When this failed to stop the machine, he grabbed cans spilled from the belt and hurled them at a wall switch six feet away until he hit it.

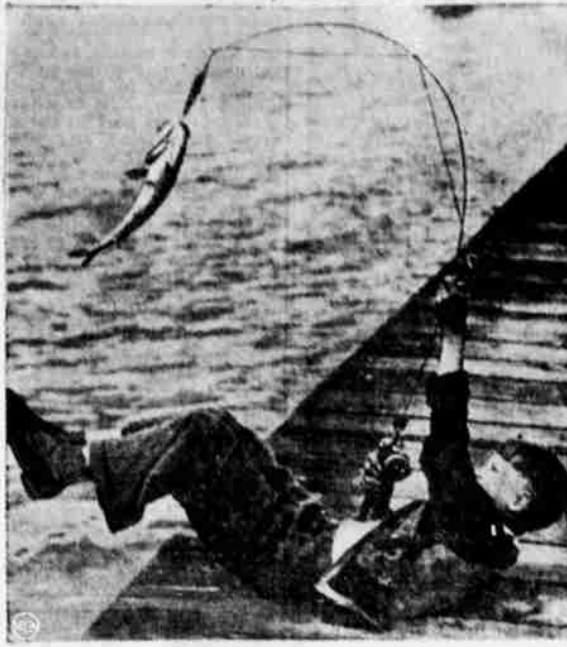
The bench, according to a bank official, is for those persons who can't control their grief over the passing of OPA. So far it hasn't been used.

# Seven All-Star Marks Set During Rout Of Nationals

BOSTON, July 10 (AP)—Five individual records and two club records were set and five others tied in yesterday's golden baseball game between the American and National league all-stars at Fenway park. In addition the crowd of 34,908 contributed to the largest paid gross receipts for a single game, \$111,338.

Ted Williams, the Red Sox gladiator boy, accounted for four new marks, tied two and helped his team set two others. Bobby Feller, Cleveland's fireball pitcher, set one while his opposing starting moundman, Claude Passeau of the Chicago Cubs, tied another. The American league's 12-0 rout of the National not only was the most lopsided score of the 13 meetings but also the junior circuit's first victory via a shutout.
