

Moscow Paper Denounces Writings Of U. S. Scribe

MOSCOW, July 11 (AP)—The official communist newspaper Pravda asserted today that Brooks Atkinson, former New York Times correspondent in Moscow, was an "untalented slanderer," "a kangster of the pen" and a "product of the stock exchange and black market."

The Pravda writer, David Zaslavsky, criticized Atkinson for saying he found "an iron curtain" in Russia and that this term is a "devilishly appropriate expression."

The Pravda writer said Atkinson was a writer who "jumps out" after living "ten months behind that infamous 'curtain.'"

The Pravda article continued: "What a sensation! Pricking up their ears and straining their eyes, the trusting American people are ready to know the secrets of the de-screened world. But there awaits them deep disappointment."

The Pravda article then dealt with Atkinson's statements saying that inside the Soviet Union there existed no kind of freedom, no democracy but only totalitarianism.

"Old Twaddle" Zaslavsky said the Times writer was repeating "old twaddle" without noting "in what a laughable and foolish situation he placed himself. This is not plain slander; this is undignified slander."

Dealing with Atkinson's claim that there were grounds for believing the Soviet Union was interfering in French politics, subsidizing the French communist party and giving it directives, the Pravda writer said:

"It would be altogether useless to speak with this savage. It is impossible for this product of the stock exchange and the black market to understand that the party, uniting an appreciable part of the French people, does not need directives and will not tolerate any such directives."

The Pravda article said At-

kinson's articles were evidences of demands of the "newspaper monopoly capitalists" for "freedom of the press."

"They demand full freedom for slanders and lies," the Pravda article asserted. "They want to establish as international law the irresponsibility of swindlers and bandits of the pen."

(At the Times offices in New York it was said that neither the Times nor Atkinson intended to make any reply to Zaslavsky's attack.)

A series of three articles by Atkinson, giving his opinions of Russia based on his 10 months' stay in Moscow, were published in the New York Times this week.

Atkinson said the United States would have to abandon "the familiar concepts of friendship" in dealing with Russia because "friendship is not wanted, is not possible and is not involved." Writing of the Soviet government, Atkinson said "despite its sanctimonious use of the word 'democracy,' it is a totalitarian government" and "the familiar dictatorship of the proletariat is actually a dictatorship of the 13 members of the Politburo of the communist party."

Atkinson pictured the 13 men as products of revolution and of an age when Russia was shunned. He declared "there are no freedoms inside the Soviet Union." He said the United States and Russia were "not enemies, but we are not friends."

Armed Peace Only Hope

"The most we can hope for is an armed peace for the next few years," Atkinson wrote. "Where our interests lie, we have to apply equal power in the opposite direction. . . . The spirit of the Soviet government is fundamentally reactionary, as its attitude toward defeated nations and the behavior of the red army in Manchuria suggests."

He declared an estimated 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 political prisoners were living in jail or exile. He said "it is not the nature of men like members of the Politburo to feel secure" because they were "leaders of a backward poorly organized country that is trying to lift itself by its bootstraps in a hurry."

"The spirit of the Soviet government is anti-foreign," Atkinson wrote. "There has been a nameless terror about foreigners, who are regarded as spies and enemies. . . . The leaders imagine every man's hand is against them; they imagine they are surrounded." The correspondent said he suspected that the Russian leaders "are rather commonplace men who have no experience in democracy at home and are confused by manifestations of democracy abroad."

He wrote that "the basic fact is that the Soviet Union is a socialist state developing and expanding in a capitalist world" and that "according to the communist party line, the Soviet is not secure as long as capitalistic countries like the U. S. and Great Britain hold dominant positions in the world."

Teen-Age Club To Shut Down

The high school Teen-Age club, in the armory, an exclusive club for high school students and alumni, will close July 13 for one month, according to Mary O'Brien, member of the student teen-age committee. Repairs are being contemplated by the committee in the club's quarters.

Plans for remaining open during the coming month were abandoned when students from both Klamath Union high school and the Sacred Heart academy failed to show enough interest to merit remaining open. The month of August is usually an annual vacation for the committee, according to Miss O'Brien.

The adult advisory committee met with the teen-age group Tuesday night and recommended the closing. The club will be open again on August 17. Schedules of nights on which the club will be open next year will be worked out later by the group.

N. Y. Restaurateur Gets Prison Term

NEW YORK, July 11 (AP)—Henry Lustig, president of the Longchamps restaurant chain, today was sentenced to a four-year prison term on his conviction on charges of evading payment of \$2,872,766 in federal income taxes.

Judge Harold Kennedy also fined Lustig \$115,000.

E. Allen Lustig, nephew of the restaurateur, drew a three-year prison term and Joseph Sobel, chief accountant for the chain, was sentenced to two years imprisonment for their part in the alleged conspiracy.

Lloyd Paul Stryker, chief defense counsel, gave notice of appeal and the defendants remained free under \$5000 bail.
