

Vandenberg Is Top Man In Intelligence Service

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—If atom bombs should fall by surprise on the United States within the next few years, Lieut. Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg probably would be blamed for it.

The president has given him the top U. S. intelligence job, director of the central intelligence group (CIG). It's his responsibility to know whether various intelligence agencies are doing their work and to digest their information for the benefit of policy-making officials.

He doesn't look like the master mind of an international intelligence system, the sinister figure encountered in novels and movies. He is a pleasant army flyer, tall and handsome, cheerfully profane, easy to talk to, decidedly good company.

One can't avoid the impression he is young, despite his 47 years and his iron-gray hair.

Much-Decorated Officer

"Might as well be comfortable," he said as we settled down on a leather couch in his office, and I accustomed myself to the glare of six rows of many-colored ribbons, replete with stars, rosettes and oak leaf clusters. Some were garnered in the "wild blue yonder" and some awarded for staff and com-

mand work in Africa and Europe.

A large globe sits next to the general's desk, and four airplane models rest on tables, desks and bookcases. Much of the talk is about aviation, for the general's heart is obviously still in the air. He got in 80 hours of flight time in May, piloting his own B-25. He usually flies in his flying with a business trip. During the war he flew the B-17, the B-26, P-51, P-38 and the British Spitfire.

Of his work during the war, he says simply "I spent a lot of time in Europe with 'the brass'."

Now 'Brass' Himself

He forgets, apparently, that Hoyt Vandenberg himself now is rated as "the brass."

He held various staff posts in Great Britain, Africa, Sicily and Washington. In 1944 he had command of the ninth air force in the European theater. Until he received his present appointment he was G-2 of the war department general staff, reorganizing the army's intelligence.

Vandenberg is a native of Milwaukee, Wis., a West Point man, class of 1923. He and Mrs. Vandenberg live at Fort Meyer, Va., and have two children—a daughter, 20, and a 17-year-

old son, who has just been appointed to West Point.

"Intelligence is one of the most important things in the world," he said. "A nation that operates the way we do, with a small army and little emphasis on military affairs in peacetime, must know what to expect from other nations."

Of his program for the CIG he says only: "We have big plans, plenty of ideas, but now we are just in the organizational stage. Give us time and public support, and we'll make this thing work."

Oregon Airport Men To Meet In Portland

PORTLAND, July 12 (AP)—Oregon's airport and flight school operators will hold their second statewide meeting here next Thursday.

Jack Miffing, president of the newly organized group, said members would study the new regulations proposed by the state board of aeronautics to be administered under the vocational school law; new requirements for schools giving flight training under the GI bill; and a code of fair practices and uniform prices for flight instruction, plane rental and charter service.

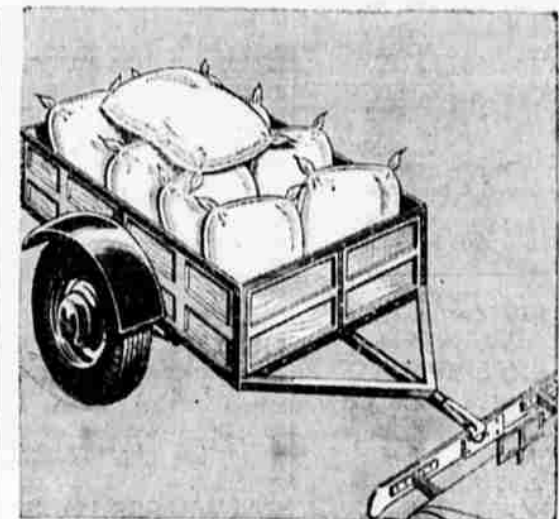
