

# Seals Supplant Oaks In Front

The road to the pinnacle led through 16 agonizing innings, but the long-challenging San Francisco Seals walloped above the rest of the Pacific Coast Baseball league today.

Finally breaking through the hurling of Al Olsen in the marathon with the San Diego Padres for a 3-2 victory last night, San Francisco hopped a half game ahead of Oakland's pennant hopefuls, who tumbled before the tail-end Seattle Rainiers 2-1.

San Diego got a two-run lead, scoring in the first and third, but the Seals made it up on Ferris Fain's single and Neil Sheridan's and Don White's doubles in the sixth. From that point the game coasted along with no dents on the scoreboard until Vince DiMaggio doubled and scored on Roy Nicely's single in the 16th.

The toppling of the Oakland Acons from the league lead, to which they had clung since close pursuit by the Seals since last May, came on an old college try made good by Tony York of the Rainiers in the ninth inning.

Going into the ninth with a 1-0 advantage, the Acons used three hurlers, Ralph Buxton, the starter, Tom Hafey and Floyd Speer in a vain effort to stem the Seattle rally. Earl Tustison opened the inning with a double, and York drove him home. Hafey walked pinch-hitter Hal Patchett. Another pinchhitter, Hugh Poland, greeted Speer with a single, and York slid home in an exciting finale for a close deciding run.

Sacramento's Solons overtook the Seals for fifth rank in the standings by shutting out the Portland Beavers, 2-0. Garth (Red) Mann, who earlier this season pitched a no-hit game, allowed the Beavers six hits, and the Solons pounded Jack Salvason of the Beavers for nine. Both of the runs were unearned and were scored by Joe Marty, with an error in each case chalked to Beaver Shortstop Eddie Wheeler.

Hollywood and Los Angeles had a tight pitching duel which was won by Hollywood's Eddie Erault 1-0. Erault's tight-fisted mound performance let the Angels have only three hits, while his teammates nicked Don Osborn for five. The winners fashioned their run out of Tony Lupien's single and Leftfielder Frank Kalin's double in the first innings.

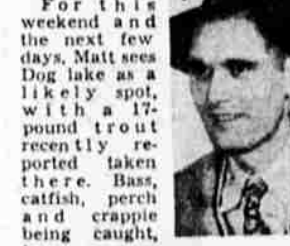


## Fishing Roundup

"Fishing Fun," Matt Finnigan's angling features which is broadcast over KFLW every Friday night is becoming known as the sportsmen's dictionary up and down the coast. For this weekend and the next few days, Matt sees trout fishing from the shore. The Chewaukan river will do well by the fisherman who will stick it out all day and not get discouraged. Grey flies or worms and single eggs should work.

The Upper lake has reported good fishing all over, and the same goes for Wood river and Seven-mile. Trolling is the usual method, with flashers and worms.

Fly fishing should be good late in the afternoon on Paulina, with dark flies cast in towards shore from a boat. Deep creek has turned up some trout and 10-inchers on worms as bait or behind a flasher.

## Fading Brooks Lose Space As Cards Sweep Twin Bill

Leave it to the Dodgers to upset one of major league's baseball's most ancient traditions.

Of the 18 National League clubs that have led the pack on July Fourth only to yield first place to another team in the past 46 years, five of them represented Brooklyn. And it appeared today that unless the skidding Dodgers right themselves pretty quick, they might make it six of the last 19.

The Cardinals gained a game and a half on the league leaders yesterday by sweeping both ends of a doubleheader from the New York Giants 2-1 and 5-4 while the Chicago Cubs handed the Dodgers their second straight defeat, 13-2.

Led by little Peanuts Lowrey who rammed home seven runners and scored three on a home run and two singles, the Cubs battered three Brooklyn hurlers for 15 hits and easily notched their fifth straight home triumph over the Dodgers.

Dave (Boo) Ferriss gained his 13th pitching success and his eighth straight over Detroit as the American league leading Boston Red Sox defeated the Tigers 4-2 to increase their margin over the idle New York Yankees to eight games. A crowd of 26,290 increased the Red Sox attendance for 40 home games to 740,517, 10,000 more than their previous record high set in 1942.

Johnny Sain pitched a one-hitter as the Boston Braves eked out a 1-0 decision over the Cincinnati Reds. A double by Grady Hatton in the first inning prevented the elongated right-hander from registering a perfect game as Hatton was the only Redleg to reach base.

The cellar dwelling Pittsburgh Pirates quelled a ninth inning Philadelphia rally to defeat the Phillies 4-3 and move to within three games of the seventh place Quakers.

## Modocs Plan Saddle Trip

The Modoc tribe's fourth annual ride and horseback weekend in the mountains will be held August 1, 2, 3 and 4 in the South Warner mountain region of Modoc National forest.

Horsemen will have their mounts and gear at the John Neer corral, a mile and a half east of Alturas by the morning of August 1 to start from there, or at the Fitzhugh ranger station the next morning, to take up the ride from there.

The riders will leave Fitzhugh ranger station August 2 for Mill Creek meadows by way of Pine Creek basin. Riders from Cedarville will join the party at Pine creek.

The next two days the party will be broken up into small groups for various fishing and scenic trips. Ivan Sack and Bud Smith are in line to organize these side trips.

For persons not wanting to make the long trip on horseback, a truck will leave the Niles hotel in Alturas Friday morning, August 2, for the party's base camp at Mill creek.

Blankets and all camp equipment will be furnished by the forest service and eats will be furnished from the chuck wagon. Anyone with a bedroll should take it along.
