

# Rotary Club Hears Talk By Idahoan

Ralph Gale, executive secretary of the Idaho committee of the National Farm Chemurgic council, told Klamath Rotarians at their meeting Friday of work of the chemurgic council in developing additional markets for farm products.

He described Idaho as being a long way from big markets, with practically no local consuming market, and suggested that the Klamath basin is in similar circumstances and facing similar problems.

Research to find higher value per ton from crops, thus cutting down freight costs and research to find new industrial uses for farm crops, thus helping to eliminate the problems of over production of crops, is the work of the Chemurgic council, he said.

Gale, industrial development man for the Idaho Power company, cited instances of developing industrial products from milk, potatoes, soy beans, sawdust and straw.

Francis E. Williamson Jr. of the United States forest service, stationed in Portland, spoke briefly on forest fire prevention. He said that last year Klamath county had fewer man-caused fires than any other county in Oregon, but that the record for man-caused fires in Rogue river and Fremont national forests is poor.

W. H. Derry of the Oregon state committee of the National Farm Chemurgic council; Father Joseph S. McGrath, head of the chemistry department of Portland university; and Lt. Robert B. Metcalf of the 5th Marine division, were guests of the club. Ed Geary was chairman of the day for Rotary.

In November, 1914, he married Zona Watson. They had three children, Glenn, Mrs. Clara Moser and Ora Jean.

Besides his immediate family he leaves one brother, George, Lakeview; three sisters, Mrs. Flint Vernon and Mrs. Price Vernon, Lakeview, and Mrs. Anna Berg, Tulelake, and one grandchild.

PORTLAND, July 13 (AP)—Passengers like electric trolleys better than gasoline buses, a city commissioner said today in recommending that some trolleys be ordered for Portland's transportation system.

Commissioner Dorothy McCollough Lee recommended to the city council that Portland Traction company be authorized to buy only 100 gasoline motor coaches, and be directed to order electric trolleys to replace ancient crowded streetcars.

She said a combination of the electric trolleys and gasoline motor coaches seemed most satisfactory. The company had asked permission to purchase 175 gas coaches.

# Awesome Celestial 'Bomb' Spread Terror Years Ago

Almost exactly 38 years before the recent bomb-burst near Bikini, an awesome missile hurtled from the sky in fire and thunder, and wrought widespread havoc in northern Asia. On the clear morning of June 30, 1908, at 8 o'clock, the inhabitants of central Siberia were terrified by a blinding ball of fire, more brilliant than the sun, tearing the sky from south to north and radiating such heat that it was felt scores of miles distant.

As it struck the forested terrain north of Vanavara, there leaped upward a column of fire 300 miles; and its flash on the horizon for another 200 miles. Later there came mighty air blasts and frightful sounds, which carried 900 miles. Powerful earth waves went twice around the world. During the following week, curious "night glows" illuminated the nocturnal skies over most of Europe.

A peasant living about 40 miles from the place of impact of this Siberian meteorite reported that he was sitting on his porch and felt such heat that he thought it would burn his shirt off. The force of the air wave which came later knocked him down and rendered him unconscious for a time. Windows were broken and in places the ground was torn up. Many instances of horses being thrown to the ground were reported. At 250 miles from the landing area, fences were thrown down; at 400 miles, men were thrown from a river raft.

The landing locality, now known as Meteorite Fields, was finally found in a sparsely inhabited region. Over a wide area numerous depressions marked the places where individual pieces or groups of the mighty sky visitor had buried themselves. The evergreen trees over a stretch of 20 miles in every direction from Meteorite Fields lay prostrate and partially burned, their tops pointing away from the region of the fateful impact. A herd of 1500 reindeer in this locality was almost entirely annihilated, only a few scorched carcasses ever having been found.

Some consider this celestial bomb was actually a small comet which came too near the earth and crashed into it. Dr. W. H. Christie of Mt. Wilson observatory believes that the "night glows" visible west of the place of fall were due to the comet's tail, which was pointing away from the eastern sun.

# Lakeview Vote Due July 16th

LAKEVIEW, July 13.—Falling to pass at the election last month when the measure was defeated 65 to 63, the school board of District No. 7 is re-submitting the budget to the voters again next Tuesday, July 16.

The budget committee pared anticipated expenditures as much as they could when they submitted it to the voters in June, so the budget to be voted upon next Tuesday will be the same with additional election costs.

The tax election asked is \$57,569.80 above the 6 per cent limitation, and the budget committee believes that this amount is absolutely necessary for current school costs, which partially include maintenance and repairs, operating costs, salaries of teachers, custodians and administrators, and purchase of supplies and equipment.

Voting on the budget measure will be held at the high school auditorium between the hours of 2 p. m. and 7 p. m.
